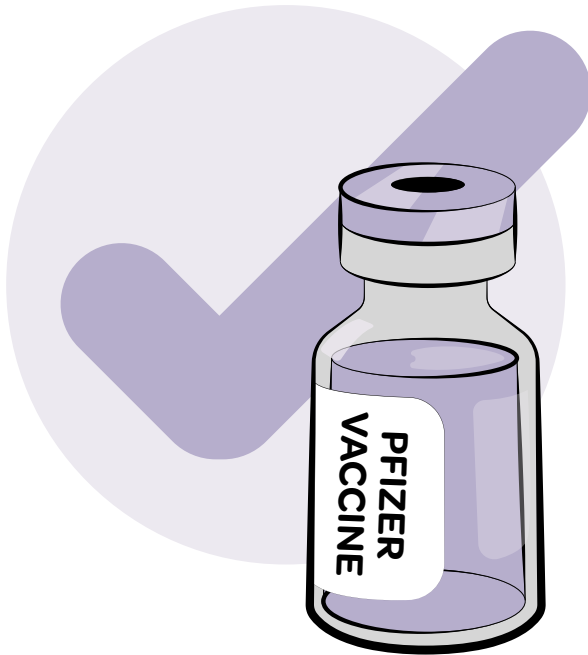

Getting your vaccination



We will do a health check with you



You will be asked to sign the consent form to be vaccinated. *This is the time you can ask any questions*



The health care worker will now vaccinate you in your arm



You'll now be monitored for 20 minutes in case you have any immediate side effects



Once we say you're fine, you can leave and carry on with your day

After receiving your vaccination



You will be invited to receive your second dose of the vaccine no less than 21 days after receiving the first dose



For the vaccine to be fully effective you must receive the second dose



Full protection against COVID-19 will occur approximately 7 days after your second vaccine dose

COVID-19 health reminders

Wear a mask on all public transport

Use the NZ COVID Tracer app to sign in
to locations; turn on Bluetooth

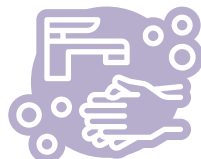
Stay home if you are sick

If you have COVID-19 symptoms,
get a test

Wipe down all commonly used surfaces

Wash or sanitise your hands

Cover coughs and sneezes



Side effects

As with any vaccine, you may experience side effects. It's important to know that this does not mean that you have COVID-19. What this means is that your body is building up your protection to COVID-19.

If you are unsure about your symptoms or they get worse, talk to your GP or call **Healthline on 0800 358 5453**.

What you may feel	What can help	When this could start
Pain at the injection site, headache and fatigue are the most commonly reported reactions.	Place a cold, wet cloth or ice pack where the injection was given. Leave it on for a short time. Do not rub or massage the injection site.	Within 6-24 hours.
Muscle aches, feeling generally unwell, chills, fever, joint pain and nausea may also occur (although this is mostly after the second dose).*	Rest and drink plenty of fluids. Paracetamol or ibuprofen can be taken, follow the manufacturer's instructions. Seek advice from your health professional if your symptoms worsen.	Within 6-48 hours.

* These symptoms may not be related to the vaccine and could be signs of an unrelated illness. Seek medical advice if you are concerned.

Pfizer FAQs

Is it free to get vaccinated?

Yes. Everyone will receive their vaccinations for free.

Who can get vaccinated?

Everyone in New Zealand can be vaccinated if they are 16 years and older. If you have serious health conditions, please check with your family doctor first. However, with each phase of the vaccine roll-out, certain groups will receive the vaccination at different times.

What about my kids who are under 16 years?

People under the age of 16 are not included for now. There's limited data available for this age group as they weren't part of the clinical trials.

Can I get vaccinated if I've already had COVID-19?

Yes. However, if you currently have serious health issues from COVID-19, you may not be well enough to receive the vaccine. If you're unsure, please check with your family doctor.

Is the vaccine safe?

The Pfizer vaccine has gone through months of rigorous clinical and scientific testing and assessments, both internationally and within New Zealand. Millions of people around the world of all different ages, gender and ethnicities have already received the vaccine with great success. The vaccine has been found safe to use.

Is the vaccine live?

No. There is no virus being injected into your body; you cannot get COVID-19 from the vaccine. The vaccine boosts immune memory by strengthening it.

Is the vaccine effective for the UK and South Africa strain of COVID-19?

Yes. Evidence has shown that the Pfizer vaccine gives you some protection against both strains.

Can I attend events (e.g. family gatherings, church services, sports) once I've had my vaccination?

Yes. You're fine to attend any large events dependent on national COVID-19 alert levels.

Can I get the MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) and flu vaccinations (Influenza) before or after I get the COVID-19 vaccination?

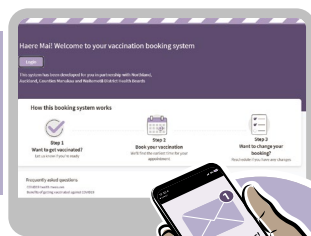
It's advised that if you are wanting to get the MMR vaccination before your Pfizer vaccination or after your second dose, that you allow 4 weeks. For the flu vaccination, it's 2 weeks. If you wish to receive any other vaccinations after receiving your Pfizer vaccination, you will need to do so 2 weeks after your second dose. Please check with your family doctor or other health professional before any vaccination.

Your COVID-19 appointments

It's important that you manage your vaccination appointments. Remember the following:



1

An initial email will be sent to make an appointment for your vaccinations.

2

You will be sent a reminder email and text message for your vaccinations before you are due to receive them. *(Remember: you'll need two doses to be fully protected)*

3

If you need to change the date, time or location for your vaccination you can do this through the Vaccination Booking System or by calling 0800 28 29 26 for Auckland or 0800 237 829 for Northland.

4

You will receive an email and text message to confirm any changes that you make.

5

Attend your vaccination appointments.

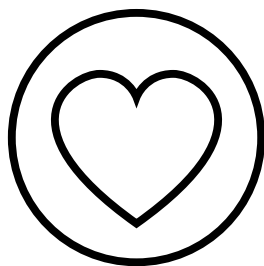
