



Why should we love our neighbour?

Starter

There are four suggested ways to use this resource:

- 1. Individuals Students make a choice about each statement, True/False/Depends... Stimulate discussion with a teacher-led 'walk the room' exercise to find out the majority views in the class. If a statement 'Depends...', a student is chosen to explain why.
- 2. Pairs Pairs sort the statements into three sets: True/False/Depends...' Feedback to class. Students have to be able to give reasons.
- 3. Groups Groups arrange the statements with 1, 2, 3, 3, 2, 1 statements on each line to form a diamond shape, with the most important at the top, while discussing their reasoning.
- 4. Whole class Students stand on a continuum line to show how far they agree/disagree with each statement. Ask a selection of students to give reasons for their choices.

Plenary – If used at the start of a lesson, repeat this exercise at the end and ask pupils whether their feelings have changed, stayed the same or been reinforced. Alternatively, use as a plenary only, asking pupils to explain choices.
