## **Autumn 2025: Ethiopia Water tanks**


World Gifts: Water for a family (£35), Water bundle (£350) Community Water Supply (£750)

Hello everyone and welcome to the Autumn term assembly from CAFOD.




CAFOD is the Catholic Agency for Overseas
Development. They are the official aid agency of the
Bishops' Conference and a member of Caritas
Internationalis, one of the largest aid agencies in the
world. Every year Caritas works with 1.3 billion people
around the world, of all faiths and none. They pride
themselves on being there before, during and after an
emergency. However, the global reach is only made
possible because of the local experts. We'll be talking
more about that bit today!



Who got a new water bottle ready for the start of term? I wonder what Top Trumps rating your water bottle would score. These water bottles hold differing amounts of water so slightly different scorings for capacity. However, some are not very practical because they are very big so you have to carry it around and with an open straw, they'd lose water through evaporation.



What about other water storage options? Who has a garden water butt? Very practical and does not leak. Finally, a camel! A camel does store water – but not in their humps as you might have heard but in their bloodstream. The camel got an overall score of 78 which made the camel the winner on a number of categories. It was all going so well for the camel until we heard about CAFOD's water tank project in Ethiopia.



This water tank can hold over 150,000 litres of water, more than any of these other options. It's also incredibly practical, especially for the community in Ethiopia that rely on this water tank for periods of drought due to adverse climate-change related weather. It really is the hydration hero so CAFOD would love our help this term to raise money for more water tanks like this.

The prophet Amos writes some beautiful poems in Amos chapter 5, where he declares that justice would roll down like waters, and righteousness like a stream. Do you notice how he's used the image of water in two ways? Water can be both powerful as it rushes down and also gentle, as it trickles down in streams. When we speak of injustice we want God to come in power to wash it all away, and when we speak of hope and righteousness, it is gentle, like lots of little streams providing daily water through the wilderness. We need both!



Abbiott told us that he would like to build more water tanks across the area he's responsible for. CAFOD knows that a better world really does need all of us so they are hoping you might consider helping them raise more money for water tanks this term so Abbiott and others in similar roles can help even more people experiencing drought.



Let's pray now as we give thanks for the gift of water. The last line in this prayer links back to the Jubilee, which of course, still continues this academic year. When we get to that final line where we pledge to wash away injustice, I'd like us to think about all the things we've done last year and all the things we will do this year as Pilgrims of Hope.
