Celebrating the Year of St Francis

In 1226, at the age of 44, St Francis of Assisi welcomed “Sister Death.” To mark the 800th anniversary of the beloved saint’s death, Pope Leo XIV has called a special Year of St Francis. So, what can the Poor Man of Assisi teach us today?

Care for our common home

St Francis saw God’s presence in all creation. He famously preached to the birds and, according to legend, convinced a wolf to live in peace with its human neighbours.

In 1979, Pope St John Paul II declared Francis the patron saint of ecology. He is Pope Francis’ namesake and inspired the late Holy Father’s encyclical on care for the earth.

Sowing seeds of peace

Like us, St Francis lived in turbulent times. In the encyclical *Fratelli Tutti*, Pope Francis celebrates the saint’s example of sowing “seeds of peace,” recalling especially his visit to Sultan Malik-el-Kamil in Egypt during the Crusades in a courageous effort to end conflict.

I have done what was mine to do...

Towards the end of his life, St Francis said:

***“I have done what was mine
to do, may Christ teach you
what is yours.”***

As we celebrate this special Year of St Francis, may we continue to discern what is ours to do, as we seek to live in right relationship with God, one another and all creation.

Finding neighbours far from home: Meet the migrants building a better world in Lebanon

Sunday 27 September is World Day of Migrants and Refugees. This is a day of prayer and solidarity with all our neighbours around the world who are forced to flee their homes.

But just because you leave your home, that doesn't mean you have to leave behind the spirit of being a good neighbour. In Lebanon, a group of African migrants came together to start their own volunteer organisation, and now with your support they are helping to make their new home a better place for all.

Neighbours coming together



"We mainly came together to try to negotiate prices because the cost of labour for migrants was too low," says

Viany, the group's founder. "As a result, we created a kind of solidarity, mutual aid. At first it was two or three people and now there are almost 300 of us."

The volunteers help migrants and refugees that have settled in the country after fleeing violence, injustice and extreme poverty. To people who have left everything they know behind, home, friends, family, they offer a friendly face and a helping hand.

"If someone is sick now on the street, or at the beginning of the war there was a pregnant woman who didn't have the money to pay for hospital bills, didn't know where to give birth, and had nothing with her – that's when someone will call us, and we will find all the means possible to help them. And we do that every day."

'In times of crisis, we help everyone'

Viany and her team provide food, hygiene supplies, clothes, pyjamas and blankets for families who have fled with nothing. And they don't stop there – they help their new Lebanese neighbours when they need it too.

"In times of crisis, we help everyone, we assist everyone regardless of their nationality. We work with everyone, migrants or not.

We must not forget that even the communities that are also helping

are in need of support, so we don't exclude them, we don't tell them that it's just for the displaced people, and not for you who are helping. The food we give, the cleaning and hygiene items are for everyone."

Voices from Sudan

It has been three years since war engulfed Sudan, uprooting millions of lives. Thousands upon thousands of you have donated, called on your MPs, prayed and fundraised to help respond to this devastating crisis.

Thank you for never forgetting that, at the heart of every crisis, and every emergency response, are real people. Here some of those people share their experiences in their own words.

Halima fled her home and now lives in a camp where she was given emergency food

"I came here one month ago and I was ambushed on the road.

There was not enough food. We struggled because we were carrying our elders and our children, so it was very tough for us to walk.

We arrived here with nothing, and I thank the people here, they welcomed us and they gave us food to eat. Until then I had no shelter or even mats to sleep on."

Eklas joined sessions led by our partner Caritas Sudan raising awareness about safety and hygiene in the camps

"The awareness sessions Caritas Sudan have provided us are one of the most beautiful things that have happened. We have gotten used to meeting them regularly and when they don't come we miss them a lot."

Kayode is CAFOD's Head of Africa and recently visited Sudan to monitor the work your donations have made possible

"Your donations are an act of steady love for our neighbours, a way of saying: we will not abandon you, we will stand with you until peace is restored. It is like the Good Samaritan who stopped,

cared for the wounded man, paid for his treatment, and promised to give more if needed. That is the kind of faithful solidarity Sudan needs today."

Latin America:

The fight to defend our common home

Our common home sustains all life. When nature thrives, we do too. Yet, the people who defend the environment and human rights are under threat.

In the last ten years, 1,900 defenders have been killed for protecting our common home. That's 190 lives lost every year. Most of them – 82 per cent – were from Latin America.

Who are human rights and environmental defenders?

Human rights defenders are people or groups who peacefully stand up for their rights.

They work to protect things like democracy, our common home and people's social and economic wellbeing. They can be well-known campaigners, local activists, or individuals working quietly, sometimes at great personal risk, to bring about justice.

How do you support those protecting our common home?

You help your sisters and brothers in Latin America fight for their home and the environment they live in.



Colombia

In Colombia, the Cerrejón coal mine is one of the world's largest open-pit coal mines. It is also linked to environmental destruction and serious human rights violations.

Here, you are supporting the Indigenous Wayúu and Afro-Colombian communities to protect their lives and land, seek justice and secure accountability in the UK and internationally.

Brazil

In Brazil, illegal gold mining threatens indigenous communities and our common home.

You help indigenous young people use drones to capture photos of deforestation caused by illegal mining. These photos are used for reports to prevent further destruction.

Honduras

In Honduras, local defenders protect the Guapinol river from harmful extractive projects like mining.

You speak up with them, support their safety, and maintain their livelihoods, like after the killing of environmental leader Juan López.

Remembering our friend Juan López



In September 2024, environmental activist Juan López was shot dead as he travelled home from church. We join with others in Honduras and around the world calling for justice over his death.

Paz Redondo, CAFOD's country representative for Central America, says: "We continue to mourn the loss of our friend and brother Juan López and call for all those involved with his murder to be brought to justice. Environmental and human rights defenders protecting our common home are innocent targets in places like Honduras."

Living water: The Season of Creation

Each year, from 1 September to 4 October, Christians worldwide celebrate the Season of Creation. It is a dedicated time to give thanks for the gift of our world and to renew our commitment, through prayer and action, to care for our common home.

A vision of abundance

This year's theme, Living Water, is drawn from Ezekiel 47. It offers a powerful image of a river flowing from the Temple, becoming a great torrent of life, fruitfulness, and healing.

"Everything will live where the river goes." (Ezekiel 47:9)

But according to the United Nations, 2.1 billion people – one in four globally – lack access to safe drinking water. The climate crisis exacerbates the problem through devastating droughts and floods.

A river of hope

Yet, Ezekiel's vision is ultimately one of hope. A hope we see reflected in global action. It is demonstrated by the communities, featured in our Lent appeal, who established floating gardens in flood-prone areas and solar-powered irrigation in parched lands.

You also live out this hope, inspired by faith to walk for water, pray and

campaign for change, and give generously so that all creation may flourish.

In this Season of Creation, may God's love flow through us all, opening hearts and inspiring us to bring healing to our common home.

Delivering babies at the clinic

"During the delivery, it's now very easy for the nurses because you supported us by installing solar-water pump systems." **Yeukayi, 45, care worker.**

Before the pump, the clinic had no water. Midwives can wash their hands and equipment without needing to collect water, or asking pregnant mothers to bring water to the clinic.

Barriers to freedom: **A Palestinian Christian lawyer speaks out**



Thousands of miles from the West Bank, part of the occupied Palestinian territory, in our office in London, Dalia speaks about the responsibility of being a Christian Palestinian, a woman and a human rights lawyer in Bethlehem.

“You advocate for the rights of women in a patriarchal society, under occupation, and you advocate for the rights of your community – the last remaining Palestinian Christians in the land that brought Christianity to the entire world,” says Dalia.

Dalia promotes human rights and international law, fighting for justice in the Holy Land with your support. She is the founder of Balasan Initiative for Human Rights. An organisation run by Christian Palestinian women using the law to seek justice for our sisters and brothers in the occupied Palestinian territory.

In the West Bank, Palestinians face daily restrictions and violence from Israeli settlers and military forces. This includes checkpoints. And checkpoints are everywhere. They are a daily reality for all Palestinians.

“We have many new checkpoints which means it is inevitable for Palestinians to have to cross a checkpoint to go to work, university or to school,” Dalia explains.

These barriers are not just an inconvenience, they can be deeply traumatic.

“Women are specifically targeted by the Israeli soldiers at the checkpoints,” says Dalia. “They are humiliated. They are beaten up, assaulted, physically and psychologically. We have reports of sexual harassment and strip searches at the Israeli checkpoints.”

“Many of the young women who are going to their university cannot tell their parents that they were beaten or sexually violated or harassed at a checkpoint, because their parents will not allow them to go to the university anymore because they don’t want them to go through this again.”

But a better world needs all of us – to speak out when human beings are being harmed.

And you help Dalia raise her voice. Your donations help her fight for human rights across the occupied Palestinian territory. You support Balasan’s research and advocacy, helping document the realities facing Palestinian Christians and promote human rights internationally.

Back in London, Dalia explains the urgency of her visit: to meet with MPs, present evidence of human rights violations, and warn of the dramatic decline of the Christian Palestinian community.

Bethlehem – where Dalia works – is now almost completely surrounded by illegal Israeli settlements.



These are Israeli communities built on occupied land. They are considered illegal under international law and one of the main barriers preventing progress towards a more just and peaceful future. In June 2026, Israeli settlers attacked the Christian Palestinian town of Taybeh, setting fire to farmland, destroying property and firing on civilians.

Dalia urges us to use our voice to raise attention to the situation “before we have no Christians left.”

We are listening and speaking out, and you can too.

How are women leading the way on overcoming poverty?

“Women are being leaders, making decisions, standing up and talking without fear.”

In Sierra Leone, women and girls in rural communities often miss out on going to school due to poverty and discrimination. Work can be hard to find without an education – and this can trap women in poverty.

And according to UN Women, one in ten women worldwide lives in poverty. That’s why we stand with experts like Fatima working with women on topics like finance and literacy.

With your donations, Fatima helps run a project supporting women to save, start small businesses and learn how to write.

And the change gets passed down generations.

“Now we are seeing women learning to write their names and teaching their children to read,” Fatima said.

Women here are now thriving. With help from the projects you support, many women have secured work to earn a living. This money goes towards their children’s school fees, the next generation of women.

How a historic coal town in Colombia is supporting the green transition

The United Nations climate change conference, COP31, is taking place in a few months in Türkiye. But a smaller international meeting is also making big waves. And here's why we're excited.

Earlier this year, the city of Santa Marta, in Colombia, hosted 57 countries in the *First Conference on Transitioning Away from Fossil Fuels*. This meeting gave countries space to look more closely at the practical steps needed to transition away from coal, oil and gas.

Indigenous leaders and non-profit groups – including many of the groups and individuals we work with – joined the meeting to speak with decision makers. This was an important opportunity to make sure UN processes are grounded in human rights and the protection of local communities.

A milestone for the Church

An important moment happened for our Catholic community just before the summit. The bishops' conferences of Latin America, Africa, and Asia released a joint "Manifesto for Our Common Home."

This manifesto shows unity. It reminds leaders that energy policy must serve the dignity of the human

person and the protection of the most vulnerable.

Bishop Juan Carlos Barreto of Soacha, Colombia, who was involved in the development of the manifesto and the Santa Marta conference, says:

"The Catholic Church is concerned about these issues because we start from the perspective of creation theology. God created this world for us to care for it, not to destroy it. This is why many Catholic leaders have gathered here in Santa Marta."

A roadmap for justice

Thanks to climate campaigners across the world, governments at the Santa Marta conference made the following commitments:



Trade measures: Over 50 countries agreed to work together on trade policies to reduce the use of coal, oil and gas.



Financial reform: Countries will consider financial changes to tackle debt issues and reduce subsidies that keep fossil fuels in use.



Steering committee: A voluntary group was set up to continue the work and connect it to wider climate efforts.

As COP31 approaches, an important question remains: can the political ambition in Santa Marta influence the climate talks in Türkiye?

**“My faith drives me

Ruwadzano, Zimbabwe



In Rushinga, north of Zimbabwe, I put your donations into action. Your support helps me work alongside communities who walk miles each day for water. To share the impact of your generosity, I've answered a few questions about my work.

What do you do?

I'm the monitoring and evaluation officer in Zimbabwe. My role involves ensuring we make an impact in the community. Monitoring all projects, the outcomes and the outputs.

Seeing transformation in the communities is what really makes me happy, seeing those who do not have access to water just get water. It's a life changing impact to them.

What was it like growing up?

I grew up seeing women carrying buckets of water, walking long distances to fetch water, because I lived in a rural community. It made me feel very sad because I realised that they were walking long distances, and you'd see some of them were really tired from carrying water.

My father inspired me. He was a nurse and health professional. So, I would see a lot of people coming to us for help from him.

Why does lack of water affect girls?

The challenge of collecting water affects the girl's attendance in school, and even participation in school. Before they go to school, the girls have to fetch water. And then in some instances, they fetch water to actually carry to school to use at the school.

How do you address these challenges?

We have been installing solar water pipe schemes, which benefit the community, the schools, the clinics. Our help is ensuring that women and girls have access to water. And not just any water, but safe and clean water.

How do you work with the community?

They do everything, they manage everything. They'll do the trenching piping, everything that needs to be done with the contractor they will choose. The community ownership of the solar water-pipe schemes starts from the beginning.

Why is faith important to you?

I am Catholic. I always pray before I leave for work. I pray in the evening. When it's difficult for me, I pray. My faith drives me to keep on working because I believe that each and every one of us has a purpose.

Do you have a message to share?

For girls around the world, believe in yourself. And remember, where you're from does not define who you become.

For many years, our people have lived with the daily burden of unsafe and unreliable sources of water.

Mothers and children walk long distances in search of water.

Families face illnesses caused by contaminated sources.

But today, we are witnessing a turning point with this borehole that we will commission here.

Clean water will flow closer to our homes.

Children can spend more time in school.

Families can enjoy better health and our communities can grow stronger in peace and cooperation."
