# A CONVERSATION WITH MARIE AND MAJELLA

Parish volunteers Marie and Majella, from St Teresa of the Child Jesus in the Diocese of Northampton, have been part of a CAFOD group for over 25 years. In recognition of their incredible service, they've recently been presented with Papal Blessings.

Marie and Majella shared with us their volunteering memories, including taking part in Jubilee 2000.



# What did receiving the Papal Blessing mean to you?

**Majella:** It was a complete and utter surprise! Oh my goodness, it was wonderful, and it was actually very humbling and also very moving. And to come from Pope Francis!

# What first motivated you both to start volunteering with CAFOD?

Marie: I got chatting to Tony Gareth (former CAFOD rep) and I said, "Oh, we haven't got a CAFOD group in our parish." And he said, "would you like to organise and start one? First thing to do is ask your parish priest if he would be happy. And if so, I will come and do a talk for you."

Majella: Marie asked me and she was instrumental in getting quite a few people involved, because she was our leader. I think with any group you always need somebody who's inspirational and encourages you.

# What was it like taking part in the *Jubilee 2000* campaign and joining the human chain around Birmingham?

Marie: We were very proud to be part of the campaign. It was wonderful that so many CAFOD volunteers took part. We work better together, and we can achieve more if different groups and organisations get together; their voice is louder and more likely to be heard.

**Majella:** I remember being very proud that it brought in so many people. So many groups were involved in this. It had a real sort of driving force.

### What does 'hope' mean to you?

Majella: I think hope means not to give up. It's a galvanizing spark to have faith and to realise hope is part of love and that it's incumbent on us to embrace the pilgrim idea. It's a journey.

They were displaced to a village on the other side of the country. Maria said their new home "was uninhabitable – the ceiling was crumbling – there was only rubble".

When freezing winter winds began to howl, Maria knew her family was in serious trouble. Imagine facing the prospect of temperatures set to drop as low as minus 20 degrees Celsius. Imagine preparing for this deadly cold



with no fuel for fires to warm your four young children. These were the challenges Maria faced. The situation looked bleak.

Maria and her husband, Stephan, were desperate: "We realised we wouldn't be able to afford firewood," said Maria. "It's too expensive. We gathered some litter to burn."

When the firewood arrived, it was like a playground for the little ones. Our emotions were off the scale because we knew it was our lifeline in winter. When there's firewood you know you can cook a meal and keep warm without problems."

We asked Maria why warmth was so important: what does warmth mean to you? She told us:


### "Warmth is the light in the stove and the light inside us all."

These beautiful words from Maria capture the spirit of Christmas – a realisation of universal Christian love – that must continue into the new year. Now, in January, we have an opportunity to help so many more families like Maria's with firewood for fuel, as well as hot food, emergency shelter and home repair kits, so that every family can survive the harshest winter weather.

In our Big Lent feature, we join Lokho on her journey of survival – her journey of hope through a devasting drought. This Jubilee year, we reflect on Lent with renewed hope as we pray and give what we can to build a better world for all.

"One day two of them died. A day after that, another. A week later, another three," Lokho tells us. "Now I have zero livestock."

Lokho, 28-years-old, survived a devasting drought. Her goats collapsed from dehydration, and there was no grass - just miles of cracked earth.

With her animals gone, Lokho was left with no way to support her young family. She had no safety net to fall back on.

#### **40 MONTHS WITHOUT RAIN**

In northern Kenya, Lokho is one of many people affected by life-changing droughts. Here, near the border of Ethiopia, there have always been dry seasons. But they're getting more extreme due to the climate crisis.

Lokho's community survived 40 months without rain. 40 months of beating sun.

To survive, her neighbours shared everything. She tells us, "My good neighbours have the habit, the tendency, of helping one another – and that is how they can survive."

Finally, the rains came – but the community had lost almost everything. They needed a new way to get food, and a plan so that when the next drought hit they would not be left with nothing.

#### "SHARING TO SURVIVE"

Lokho chats as she pushes a wheelbarrow full of water tubs. Her baby sleeps peacefully on her back. She strides toward the community vegetable farm, surrounded by her neighbours.

This small patch of land is vital to the community. Here, working side by side with our local experts, they have begun to sow the seeds of their future.

"The community are pastoralist. They entirely depended on livestock for life," explains Wakera, our local expert who works with the group. "Now we have introduced poultry and kitchen gardening."

Our experts are working with Lokho and the women as they learn techniques for growing vegetables in the arid climate, save their income and crucially they've been provided with shade nets. A special net that protects young plants from the sun.

"They provided us with that green net there," Lokho points to a large net that covers her whole vegetable patch, "The sunlight still gets to the plant, but it's not as destructive as before."

These nets act as an 'anti-greenhouse' – they keep the burning sun off the plants. This means new plants can grow in extreme heat.

Lokho and the women's group are now growing vegetables thanks

to these nets. Working together with local experts and with your support, they have renewed hope that they can get through the next drought.

## **BUILDING A BETTER WORLD FOR ALL**

Arms full of vegetables, Lokho walks back to her home. Later, she will sell the produce in her small shop and split the money between the women.

As she finishes speaking, Lokho looks across the lush green grass. "These savings will help us when we go through a time of emergency," says Lokho, "At a time when there's a food crisis, we can purchase food to save people. I feel like I'm now safe and secure."

Lokho's eyes drift to her children, playing in the yard.

"The littlest one was born towards the end of the long drought," she says. "It makes me smile now to see her walking about. I feel great pride."

Lokho has hope for her family's future, just like our journey of hope this Jubilee year.

She tells us:

"I turn to God through prayer. I pray for a better life in which to raise my children."

Thank you for showing that together we can make a real difference to lives all around the world! And thank you for joining our one big family.







# HOW TO PAINT AN ICON: A PICTURE THIS SPECIAL

Growing up in Tigray, Ethiopia, Mulugeta was ready to pursue a career in art from a young age: "I remember spending hours drawing and painting as a kid. I loved how art could transcend language and connect people through shared experience and emotions."

Mulugeta was chosen to paint an icon, commissioned by CAFOD for the Catholic Church in England and Wales, to celebrate Jubilee 2025.

Mulugeta told us: "It's a wonderful feeling to translate my ideas into physical form through the lines or colours on a canvas. Tigray is a vibrant nation with a rich history and culture. Living in Tigray gives me a unique perspective on the world and it deeply influences my art. I find inspiration in the landscape, traditions and spirit of my community. There's a deep connection between art and life here, and I'm proud to be a part of it.

"Painting this icon was a deeply spiritual experience. I felt a sense of connection to Jesus and a desire to represent him in a way that honoured my faith and cultural heritage. The colours, patterns and details all flowed from me as I tried to capture the essence of his presence.

"Painting a religious scene, especially an icon, is a very different experience. It's not just about capturing beauty or expressing personal emotions; it's about expressing faith and reverence and conveying a message that transcends the material world. There's a sense of responsibility in creating something that people will use for prayer and reflection.

"Creating this icon was a journey of faith. It made me reflect on my beliefs in a deeper way, and it strengthened my understanding of the role of art in expressing and sharing those beliefs. It's made me more aware of the power of art to inspire and uplift others."

# THE DEBT CRISIS

the most acute global debt crisis in history.

Many of us remember the historic Jubilee 2000 Debt Campaign, which led to the cancellation of \$130 billion of debt for 36 of the world's poorest countries.

Today, the situation is even more critical than it was in 2000.

The scale of the crisis is enormous: 3.3 billion people now live in countries that spend more on debt servicing than on health or education, and more than 100 countries are facing a debt crisis.

In many developing nations, nearly half of the national budget is being consumed by huge repayments on high-interest loans to wealthy banks, institutions and governments. These payments are being made at the expense of keeping hospitals running, hiring teachers, building sewage systems or recovering from damage caused by the climate crisis.

Low-income countries have been facing increasingly unsustainable debt since the 2008 financial crisis, when banks, hedge funds and traders saw an opportunity to make vast sums of money by lending with high interest rates.

Almost half of this debt is owed to private lenders, including BlackRock and HSBC, who make huge profits from these loans which are often made recklessly, and with minimum accountability.

Jubilee represents a time of grace and renewal in the Church, centred on the themes of forgiveness, reconciliation, and mercy. A Jubilee Year in the Church has historically been a time for cancelling debt and restoring equality which is why this Jubilee year CAFOD will be campaigning for life-saving action on the global debt crisis.

In a special message about the Jubilee year titled 'Hope does not disappoint', Pope Francis called for debt cancellation for low-income countries, saying it is "more than a question of generosity...this is a matter of justice."

There is specific and necessary action that can be taken during this Jubilee Year to tackle the debt crisis, and we are all needed to help make this happen.

# WHY ARE WE TALKING ABOUT THE DEBT CRISIS DURING THE JUBILEE YEAR?

The scale of this new global debt crisis means it is firmly on the international agenda. It is a priority area for the Labour government and has been a focal point for many major international meetings in recent months. The world is waking up to the need to act, and in this Jubilee Year, the time is now.

## DIDN'T JUBILEE 2000 FIX THIS PROBLEM?

The Jubilee 2000 Debt Campaign was hugely successful, on average reducing poor countries' debts by three quarters and leading to huge investments in education and healthcare. But failure to reform the structures that govern international debt, together with recent economic shocks. has led to a renewed crisis.

# SHOULDN'T DEBTS JUST BE REPAID?

Paying debts should not be put ahead of protecting people, and payments to wealthy lenders should not be prioritised over life itself. The Bible teaches us that money lending should be about helping people when they most need it, not just for making profits.

Moreover, many private lenders have lent to low-income countries at high interest rates – around 6%-10% - at a time when they were lending to wealthy governments such as the US and UK at 0%-1%. This means that many countries are not only repaying the original amounts they borrowed, but many multiples of these amounts due to accrued interest. The very reason for charging the high interest rates is because these loans are 'higher-risk' meaning that all lenders know from the outset that there is a chance that borrowers might default due to exceptional circumstances. Despite this, private lenders are refusing to accept losses on similar terms to other lenders. Private lenders cannot have it both ways - high

interest rates mean accepting the risk of default.

# DOES DEBT CANCELLATION MEAN MORE MONEY FOR CORRUPT GOVERNMENTS?

Corruption is an important problem that requires resolution. A transparent, sustainable, and permanent global debt resolution framework would create a more stable and prosperous environment within which corruption could be tackled. Clearer borrower and creditor guidelines and increased transparency would hold both lenders and borrowing governments accountable.

#### WHAT CAN WE DO?

CAFOD has produced a report, Jubilee 2025: The New Global Debt Crisis and its Solutions (cafod.org.uk/cancelthedebt), which outlines specific policy measures that can be implemented to tackle the global debt crisis. These policies include new legislation to improve the practices of private lenders and a new global framework for resolving debt crises. But all of us must come together if we are to succeed.


#### WHAT YOU RAISED AND HOW IT WAS SPENT

We spent £59.2 million this year, with £51.9 million (88 per cent) of that going directly to charitable activities around the world. We spent £7.3 million (12 per cent) on raising income so we can continue our work.

With this money we provided 578 grants in 40 countries, helping our partners continue to respond to crises in Ukraine, Gaza, Sudan, Syria, Pakistan and Afghanistan, as well as providing long-term support to communities impacted by the climate crisis, economic injustice and other issues.

Our overall income for the year was £47.9million. Incredibly, £28.6million (60 per cent) of that was raised by ordinary people giving what they could and fundraising in their parishes, schools and homes – even despite the economic challenges we've all been facing.

#### **WORK YOU'VE SUPPORTED AROUND THE WORLD THIS YEAR**

#### Sierra Leone



# WHO SAID WHAT

In preparation for the Jubilee, we asked colleagues and partners around the world what they are hopeful for. Here are some of their answers.



"There is always hope for young people. If they are given the opportunity, if they have an alternative to learn some life skills, they are capable of becoming independent. To see them taking charge of their lives – that gives me a lot of hope. To me, hope means being in charge of what you have to do; it makes your heart move."

Katy Katonda, who is part of our team in Democratic Republic of Congo. She works with young people like Daniel who pursued hope by joining a carpentry training course.



"Hope, to me, means an opportunity to look into tomorrow, knowing that the plans you have will be achieved, knowing that you'll be able to contribute to society in many ways. We hope that this conflict will come to an end and people can get back to their normal lives. But in the meantime, we will stand in solidarity with those affected by providing them much needed assistance"

Ibrahim Njugunga, CAFOD's head of humanitarian, speaks about finding hope for the people of Sudan.

"If debt gets cancelled, people in Sri Lanka will have better access to education, better prospects for better health, better funding investments for livelihoods, industries, agriculture... We will have dignity, freedom, and better rights without debt."

Sandun Thudugala, a human rights defender and social justice activist from Sri Lanka, on how he hopes debt cancellation would help.





"What I want for my family and what I want for Gaza are the same: peace. My dream is a place where I can live and work, where my wife is working, and my children can be living in a peaceful environment where there is no violence, where there's no conflict with any other party. This is the only dream that I can imagine."


