YOUTH TRAVEL AMBASSADORS







Empowering school students and their communities

Many schools across Greater Manchester have been part of the Youth Travel Ambassadors (YTA) programme since it started in 2022.

The benefits of participating are far-reaching, with students experiencing improvements to health and wellbeing, and developing communication, research, presentation, and collaboration skills. School communities benefit too – with a reduction in car use contributing to safer roads and improved air quality.

What ambassadors did:

To stop people parking on yellow zig-zag lines outside our school and reduce congestion, we devised a 'Park and Stride' scheme so school drop off and pick ups could happen away from the school gates at a local car park. We worked with the local community to implement the scheme and designed maps to share with families. We remind people to do the right thing by 'ticketing' anyone who tries to drop off or pick up outside the school gates.



What was achieved:



We've delivered a range of active travel initiatives to get more of our peers walking, wheeling and cycling. Some of these have included cycle training courses, puncture repair workshops, competitions like 'Active Travel Bingo' and '12k Steps of Xmas', and 'Walk Like A Bee Day' to celebrate the Bee Network in our local area. We also introduced a 'Park and Stride' scheme.



What was achieved:

What ambassadors did:

Congestion and the distance to school are barriers to students using active travel to get to and from school. We implemented a 'Park and Stride' scheme to reduce congestion and ran a competition to encourage students to walk or ride from further distances and get active.



What was achieved:

What ambassadors did:

Our school is located near the Fallowfield Loop cycle path so there's a great opportunity to get more students cycling to and from school. We run a 'Cycle to School Reward Scheme' and have held a 'bikers' breakfast' as part of this. We also organise Bikeability cycle training at school.
