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Course Description

A survey of the content of New Testament Biblical Theology, focusing on the relationship between the testaments and emphasizing the "better things" of the New Covenant.

- 1. Know and evaluate the competing conceptions of New Testament Biblical Theology.
- 2. Recognize the importance of Eschatology and Ecclesiology in New Testament Biblical Theology.
- 3. Understand the major biblical-theological themes of the New Testament.
- 4. Know and articulate the organic connection between the Old and New Testament.
- 5. Be familiar with the exegetical foundation for a Reformed New Testament Biblical Theology.
- 6. Recognize the necessary complementarity between Biblical and Systematic Theology.
- 7. Employ Biblical Theology to benefit one's teaching, service in the church, and life as a Christian.
