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Course Description

Following the structure of the Hebrew Bible, this course surveys the books designated as the Writings: Psalms, Job, Proverbs, Ruth, Song of Songs, Ecclesiastes, Lamentations, Esther, Daniel, Ezra, Nehemiah, and Chronicles.

Learning Outcomes

The student will be able:

- 1. To read, understand, and apply the OT Writings for personal devotion.
- 2. To identify the content of each of the books in the OT Writings.
- 3. To recognize exegetical and theological themes in the OT Writings.
- 4. To locate the unfolding story of the OT Writings within the biblical canon.
