A study of mankind in the state of innocence, sin and grace, including his creation, the material and immaterial aspects of his being, and his fall.

- 1. Interpret relevant biblical texts for developing a biblical doctrine of humanity.
- 2. Relate the doctrine of humanity to other topics in systematic theology.
- 3. Articulate the development of human nature in its fourfold state.
- 4. Appreciate the significance of covenant theology for a biblical anthropology.
- 5. Defend biblical definitions of gender, marriage, family, and sexuality.
