Course Description

A survey of church history from the Reformation of the sixteenth century to the present day.

Learning Outcomes

The primary outcome is to evaluate the early and medieval church for defining the Reformed classical tradition. At the end of this course of study, successful students will be able to:

- 1. Identify significant people, writings, places, events, and movements in Christian history from the reformation to the present.
- Explain and discuss key theological developments and controversies, especially pertaining to the formation of the reformed confessions and the rise of modernity.
- 3. Analyze primary source material by learning to read texts in contexts (TIC).
- 4. Analyze secondary source material by learning to write critical reviews.
- 5. Assess how church history informs Christian beliefs, practices, and worship today.
