Course Description

A study of the content of Old Testament Biblical Theology, focusing on the relationship between the testaments and emphasizing the "shadows" of the promised Messiah in the old covenant.

Learning Outcomes

The primary outcome is to recognize and value the theological development that occurs over the course of the Old Testament that leads to the hope for its fulfillment and completion in the New Testament. At the end of this course of study, successful students will be able to:

1. Articulate the organic nature of the covenantal development of the Old Testament.
2. Articulate the essence of each of the Old Testament covenants.
3. Articulate the relation of the message of a particular Old Testament book to its larger covenantal context.
4. Articulate the connection of the Old Testament covenants to Christ.
