Course Description

A survey of church history from the close of the apostolic age to the eve of the Reformation.

Learning Outcomes

The primary outcome is to evaluate the early and medieval church for defining the Reformed classical tradition. At the end of this course of study, successful students will be able to:

- 1. Recognize significant people, writings, places, events, and movements in church history from the close of the New Testament canon to the dawn of the Reformation.
- 2. Explain and discuss key theological developments and controversies, especially pertaining to the formation of the doctrines of the Trinity and the person of Christ.
- 3. Analyze primary source material by learning to read texts in contexts (TIC).
- 4. Assess how church history informs Christian beliefs, practices, and worship today.
