Course Description

A study of mankind in the state of innocence, sin and grace, including his creation, the material and immaterial aspects of his being, and his fall.

Learning Outcomes

The primary outcome is to understand the doctrine of humanity in its exegetical, confessional, historical, and cultural contexts. At the end of this course, successful students will be able to:

1. Interpret relevant biblical texts for developing a biblical doctrine of humanity.
2. Relate the doctrine of humanity to other topics in systematic theology.
3. Articulate the development of human nature in its fourfold state.
4. Appreciate the significance of covenant theology for a biblical anthropology.
5. Defend biblical definitions of gender, marriage, family, and sexuality.
