Course Description

This course offers a rational defense of the Christian faith, specifically contending that God exists, that God's Word is unique and reliable, and that Christ alone is the hope of salvation. The course also responds to objections from such views as Islam, pluralism, and secularism.

Learning Outcomes

The primary outcome is to know and be equipped to proclaim, defend, and contend for the gospel. This includes:

- 1. Studying the biblical mandate for and teaching on apologetics.
- 2. Knowing the gospel.
- 3. Understanding the different views of apologetics.
- 4. Defending the existence of God, authority of Scripture, and exclusivity of Christ.
- 5. Answering the common objections and key contenders to the faith today.
- 6. Putting your confidence in God and the gospel.
