

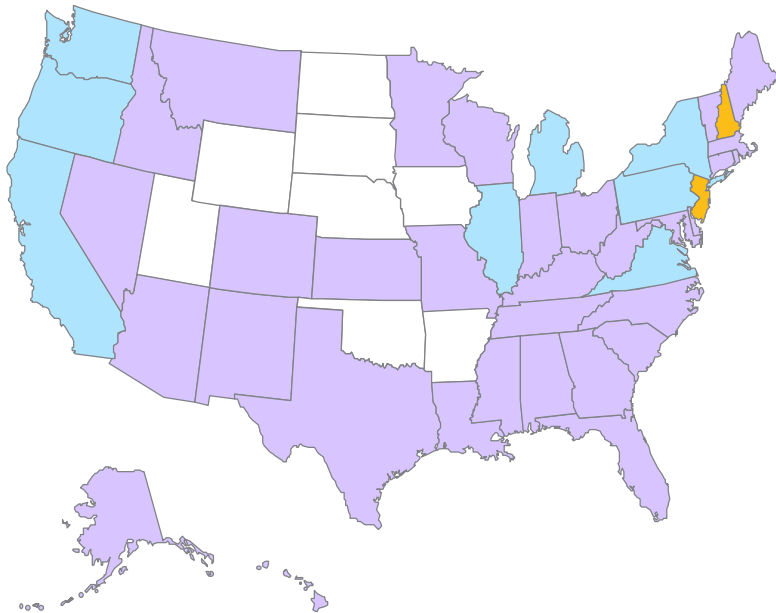

COVID-19 STAY AT HOME ORDERS AND LOOSENING / TIGHTENING REGULATIONS

HW is monitoring state websites, national news outlets, and local news outlets to compile relevant data in order to give a sense directionally for each state's path towards reopening. We are keeping track of any extensions and amendments of stay at home mandates, as well as specific regulations that point toward either loosening or tightening stay at home and social distancing orders.

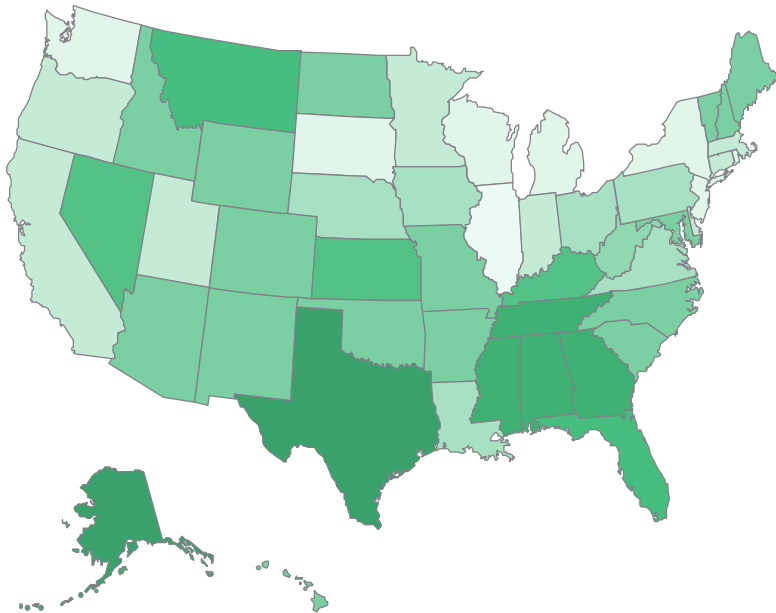
Today – 2 Governor Mandated Full Statewide Orders
