We have provided more jobs in the city, by working on Delft as the capital of technology and innovation. 





Ready for the future

Delft is changing. The climate, the housing market and the economy require new ideas. Ideas from Delft. By investing in innovations and applying them in our own city, we will find faster solutions to these problems. In this way, we use knowledge from Delft to prepare the city for the future.

Action on climate!

The weather's changing. What does that mean? More heavy rainfall and heat waves, also in Delft. Gas, coal and cement will be obsolete in 30 years time. That is why we must act now! We start at the source and bring CO2 emissions to zero as quickly as possible, we adapt the city to more extreme weather conditions and we set an energy revolution in motion. How? With knowledge from Delft!

Get started quickly

- The municipality takes charge locally. We stop discussing whether it's our job and roll up our sleeves. Otherwise, we will be too late. We bring together citizens, businesses and other stakeholders and help them to map out the route.
- STIP dares to reach for the wallet for this transition. The longterm risks are too great to do nothing. That is why we (co-)finance the expansion of the heat network, for example. In this way, more houses will be able to participate at a lower cost.
- We remove barriers. With an energy desk to provide sound advice, organising collective purchasing campaigns for residents and businesses, and removing unnecessary rules and simplifying procedures, we speed up the transition.



New energy

- As a city, we do our part. That is why we switch to sustainable energy. In Delft, this means no more use of gas in 2040, isolation and solar panels on roofs.
- The municipality continues to work together with energy cooperatives such as Deelstroom Delft. This way everyone can earn something from solar panels and other energy related projects.
- Together with organisations and businesses, we make agreements about reducing CO2 and generating energy. TU Delft, for example, is working on a geothermal source which we will soon be using to heat houses.

Towards a circular economy

- By 2050, the Netherlands will be 100% circular. So we will deal with our materials differently. That means: reduce and reuse! When we do use raw materials, we use them for as long as possible. We prevent waste by, for example, switching to using refundable cups at events.
- The biggest gains can be made in construction. That is why, for example, we want to keep a record of what materials buildings are made of. This will make it easier to reuse and separate materials during demolition.
- To set a good example, the municipality already buys its furniture in a circular way. Now we have to move on to buildings and infrastructure. That is where we can achieve the most!

Waste as raw materials

Separating waste at home or in a factory? We look at each neighbourhood to see what the most sustainable solution is. By applying tailor-made solutions we ensure that the policy is as effective as possible.

- The polluter pays. That is only fair. It also provides a financial incentive to pollute less.
- There are now six collectors of industrial waste in the inner city. STIP would like to see that reduced to one collector. This prevents waste collection lorries from driving in a row along the canals.
- We introduce the Yes-Yes sticker. This means people only receive advertising and door-to-door leaflets if they indicate so. In this way, we reduce the amount of waste in Delft.

City of technology and innovation

Delft is a popular city. That is why our population is growing. To ensure there is a job for everyone, we need 10,000 new jobs by 2040. The municipality's digital infrastructure is also becoming increasingly important. Fortunately, Delft is a city with enormous opportunities in technology and innovation. That is why we are continuing to build the ecosystem around technology and innovation, working to improve the municipality's ICT and strengthening the ties with our educational institutions.

Knowledge from Delft as a driver for jobs

- The municipality helps sustainable innovative Delft businesses to scale up by being the first to buy their products. For example, a lamppost that also charges your car.
- We turn good ideas into good businesses. Delft's start-up ecosystem is among the world's best. This generates jobs in Delft. The municipality will therefore continue to support initiatives such as YES!Delft.
- Success attracts success. We strengthen the high-tech ecosystem around Delft. This makes it even more attractive for high-tech companies to come to Delft. Delft Technology Partners, the one-stop-shop for this, gives them a warm welcome.

- Space is limited in Delft. That is why STIP wants more multitenant business buildings with shared facilities. This saves space and promotes mutual cooperation.
- Together with TU Delft, the municipality focuses on attracting conferences. Visitors stay the night in Delft and grab a bite to eat in a restaurant. This is good for our economy.
- The municipality encourages developments in sectors in which Delft excels, such as biotechnology and quantum technology. We can do this by playing a role in housing such companies.

Leader in IT

- Public money? Public code! Delft, together with other municipalities, is working on transparent service provision by focusing on open source software and open standards. This saves costs in the long term and protects the digital sovereignty of Delft.
- Free the data! STIP wants to expand Delft's open data platform (delft.dataplatform.nl). This helps innovation, the economy and local democracy. For example, we can publish metadata from sensors in public space here.
- The municipality checks algorithms that can lead to discrimination against strict guidelines.
- With new IT products or services, the municipality ensures that as little data as possible is collected. Is it necessary? Then it must be safe. In addition, 'Privacy and Security by Design' are important principles.
- Delft is playing an important role in digitisation by stimulating and supervising the construction of glass fibre cables.

Cooperation with education

- The municipality works formally with TU Delft. STIP wants to expand this with HBO and MBO institutions. Together, we attract more high-tech businesses, stand up for Delft in the region and connect education to the city.
- A good neighbour is worth more than a distant friend. TU Delft and the municipality help students and non-students to get to know each other. Student volunteering in Delft is a good example of how this can be done.
- The municipality offers students of all levels internships, assignments, (graduation) projects and traineeships for recent graduates. In this way, students can use their studies to make concrete improvements to the city.
- Study places are spread throughout the city and are visible. This will ensure that students and non-students can meet and connect. Imagine: studying in the Oude Kerk!



Vibrant city

It is nice to live in, work in or visit a lively city. Delft is such a city! The number of people in the city is growing. That is why we make room for more jobs, museums and events. In this way, there will always be something for everyone to enjoy in Delft.

Enjoying Delft

Culture connects and colours a city. It provides more jobs, makes difficult subjects discussable and brings challenge and relaxation. Due to the many cutbacks, the cultural offerings in Delft are in a bad state. In the coming period, we must invest heavily to keep the supply up to date with the demand of a growing city. We will do this together with the cultural sector and with an eye for all people in Delft.

Culture in the city

- Events make and show the identity of Delft. We continue to support our existing festivals and encourage new initiatives. We certainly want be another festival added to Delft!
- We brighten up the public space with all kinds of art. Murals, graffiti and sculptures make your neighbourhood beautiful!
- Johannes Vermeer started his painting career in Delft. STIP wants more cultural breeding places and exhibition spaces for (upcoming) artists.
- Cultural centres such as the Agathaplein with the Prinsenhof museum and Vesteplein provide liveliness. We would like to see them spread throughout the city. We will continue to support and promote them to organise events there.



Culture for everyone

- Culture must be accessible to everyone. That is why we stimulate initiatives for culture in the neighbourhoods, such as the Cultuurhuizen.
- Every child deserves a chance to discover their talents. That is why we continue to pay the contribution or lesson fee for children whose parents are unable to do so. This way, we ensure that everyone can become a sports or musical talent.
- Everyone should be able to enjoy art. That is why STIP is a fan of the art libraries and organisations such as VAK and DOK. We make sure that they receive sufficient subsidies to carry out their tasks and projects.

Things to do in Delft

- STIP wants more pop! We will bring back the pop podium and invest in pop programming. We bring new talent and established names into contact with the public.
- Young people want more places to go out in Delft. Therefore, the municipality is committed to more clubs with different things to offer.
- Performing arts are an essential part of Delft's cultural sector. The municipality ensures the preservation of theatres and is working with Theater de Veste on the Theater of the Future: a theatre that breathes technology with sufficient capacity for a city of our size.
- Delft has its own character. To show that to everyone, we give unique initiatives a place in the city. Think of a place for modern art or where technology can be experienced.
- The traces of Agneta & Jacques van Marken can still be seen in Delft. Together with enthusiastic Delfters, we make this visible in the city, for example through education, temporary exhibitions or a museum.

Delft makes it possible!

- We allocate extra money to ensure that Delft's cultural sector remains afloat. We also ensure that there is room for promising initiatives from new or existing organisations.
- The municipality says: "Yes, provided that". By thinking along and making more funds available it becomes easier to organise something. We are flexible with rules, especially for temporary cultural facilities and small-scale creative initiatives.
- Creators must be paid fairly. That is why the culture sector's codes of conduct, such as the Fair Practice Code, are applied when granting subsidies and working with cultural partners.
- Events make Delft the lively city that it is. That is why we retain Lijm en Cultuur as an events site where anything goes. We also look at other locations with their own character.



Working in Delft

The Delft economy is the beating heart of our city. Think of all the entrepreneurs and businesses. They make the city flourish and provide employment. STIP wants to stimulate entrepreneurs by providing high-quality services and facilitating business activities. This gives our entrepreneurs the space to do what they are good at.

Delft in business

- The municipality actively approaches Delft businesses, offering high-quality and accessible services and providing support for small SME businesses. All this is done in cooperation with the sector and entrepreneurs' associations.
- Delft is not just a residential city. Companies need a place in Delft. That is why STIP wants sufficient business space to remain at Schieoevers, also for the current businesses.
- STIP wants flexible office space for the self-employed and startups, for example at Schieoevers or in Nieuw Delft.
- In large construction projects in the city, we make space on the ground floor for a café, business or other fun initiatives. This makes the neighbourhood more pleasant and creates space for businesses.



Hospitality sector

- STIP wants to give entrepreneurs more space to organise small-scale music and cultural events.
- The extra terrace space provided by the catering industry during Corona brightened up the city enormously. STIP wants to preserve this liveliness!
- In the city centre and the new park near the station, everyone should be able to drink a glass of wine or a beer. It's a place where people meet. There should be no unnecessary rules, such as a ban on alcohol.
- Going out is important for meeting new people and discovering music. To be able to go out safely and enjoyably, STIP wants to continue to invest in 'Sus teams', enforcers who will address people to account for their behaviour if necessary.

Shopping

- Live jazz music in your favourite clothing store? A beer at the hairdresser's? STIP wants to make room for these kinds of combinations. That is how we keep shopping hip.
- Delft is a pleasant shopping city with few vacancies. To keep it that way, the municipality must make clear choices. We choose where in our city there is room for shops or where we want to make a smart transformation to, for example, creative manufacturing.
- We are ordering more and more online. To provide a strong response to this as a city, we help our entrepreneurs to digitize. This can be done, for example, by linking Delft's educational institutions and students to the common challenges of our entrepreneurs.

Chapter 2: Vibrant city

Destination Delft

- New tourist attractions and museums will make Delft even more fun! Think for example of the new Willem van Oranje musical. This is how we keep tourists in Delft for longer. That is good for the local economy.
- We show technology in the city. Then not only the history of Delft but also its technology can become a tourist attraction, for example a technical showcase in the city centre!
- With city-wide marketing, we put Delft on the map. STIP wants to continue with the successful theme years and pick up events citywide.
- Would you like to boat through the canals of Delft? So does STIP! That is why we are open to anything that will enable even more visitors and residents of Delft to enjoy the water. We also want to make electric boating in the inner city permit-free.



Attractive residential city


Delft is a fantastic city to live in. As the number of inhabitants grows, we must be smarter about how we use the space we have. STIP wants to improve accessibility and the quality of public space. This will ensure that Delft remains a great place to live, even with more people. Below we show how we will get there!

Living for everybody

Many people are looking for a house in Delft. Due to the housing shortage, prices shoot through the roof and there is little room to build more houses. The market cannot provide for all demand. Therefore, STIP wants the municipality to take action.

Enough houses

- STIP wants to make it easier for young people to find affordable housing. That is why we build extra youth housing and raffling off a part of the social housing.
- We want to solve the shortage of starter homes by building more starter homes. We are also giving priority to building mid-price rental and owner-occupied homes. This way we ensure that people in cheap housing are able to move on.
- To be able to build even more houses, it helps when we are open to smart constructions! Temporary housing, tiny houses and friend contracts all contribute to solving the housing shortage.



Student housing

- The TU Delft is growing, while students are already struggling to find a room. STIP therefore wants to build 3600 student homes by 2030. This will meet the current demand for student housing.
- More and more students live on and around the campus. That is why STIP wants more cafés, shops and restaurants. Because a lively campus is a great place to live!
- We want to make efficient use of the housing we have. That is why we make it possible for people to live in shared accommodation again. This will make it easier for friends to live together in large houses.
- Landlords drive up prices. We are combating this by introducing a compulsory owner-occupation requirement for new-builds. This way, a person can still buy a house for their own use.
- Loneliness has become a big problem among students. One of the reasons for this is that almost only studios are being built. Therefore, STIP wants more group homes.



Living in the right place

- We like to see different people mixed together in the same neighbourhood. By mixing, different types of people meet each other. This is how we work towards a connected city, where everyone has a nice neighbour.
- Many elderly people live in a family home. They want to move but can't find anything. As a result, there are fewer houses for families. To give them a helping hand, we offer, among other things, a senior housing agent.
- Delft has relatively more social housing than other municipalities in the region. By working together we want to better distribute the social housing stock. This can be done, for example, by launching a joint website for the supply of social housing in the region.

Assistance with housing

- We want to actively inform tenants and protect them from landlords. That's why we need a tenants' team. This is the place to go if you have questions about your home, rent or landlord.
- Houses that are rented out must be well maintained and managed. That is why we introduce enforceable guidelines for good landlord management. This will alert landlords to their duty of maintenance and care for their properties.
- First-time buyers should also be able to buy a house! That is why we have the starters loan. This makes it easier for the starter to compete in the housing market.

Sustainable living

A sustainable house is good for nature, living comfortably and your wallet. Making a house more sustainable can be hard. Sometimes this is due to the costs or people just don't know where to start. By looking at each neighbourhood to see which solution fits best, we help as many houses as possible towards a sustainable future.

Do it yourself: sustainability

- Would you like to save energy, but don't know where to start? STIP wants the municipality to be proactive in helping people in the city. In this way we can save a lot of energy and lower energy bills.
- The most vulnerable people often live in the most draughty houses. That's where most progress can be made! By starting to insulate there, we ensure that becoming sustainable reduces inequality and energy poverty.
- People with small wallets also want more comfort and less energy consumption. Thanks to the house subscription, people do not have to invest themselves. With the support of the municipality, people can make their homes more sustainable for the same monthly costs.

Building for the future

- In order to be climate neutral by 2050, we must build energyneutral buildings. We do this by imposing stricter requirements on new buildings and by building with wood more often.
- Building for the future also means taking animals into account. By making nature- inclusive building part of an environmental permit, we take the living environment of animals and plants into account!
- We make strict agreements with housing corporations to encourage them to make their homes more sustainable.

Travelling in new ways

In the coming years, Delft will grow in population. Everyone needs to move around the city. To keep Delft a clean, safe and accessible city, we must make choices. Which means of transport are appropriate and how do we best design our streets? We make the streets better for pedestrians and cyclists and make space for people to stay and meet.

The steel horse

- The bike as our number 1 priority! STIP would like to see us using this sustainable, space-efficient means of transport more. Therefore, we expand the Delft and regional bicycle network. We separate cycle paths from car traffic as much as possible and widen them where necessary.
- We encourage everyone to take the bike. That is why we are committed to good lighting, sufficient parking space, enough drinking water points, charging points for electric bicycles and more frequent right of way at traffic lights.
- Do you also never find a spot to store your bike? As many as 12 bicycles fit in 1 car parking space! STIP will solve the shortage by turning cars into bicycle parking spaces. Enforcing the bike parking rules is only possible when there are enough parking spaces.
- For commuter traffic, cycling is increasingly the solution.

 Therefore, building developments also include loss of time for cyclists instead of only loss of time for cars.



The street of the future

- Streets can easily be made a lot safer, cleaner and quieter with more space for cyclists and pedestrians. Who wouldn't want that? That is why the maximum speed in the built-up area is going to 30 km per hour.
- The street is much more than a place for moving and parking. We are committed to more greenery, accessible sidewalks for everyone, meeting places and residential streets. We make it possible for the neighborhood to renovate their street!
- The cycle path is becoming increasingly busy. New types of bicycles, scooters and mopeds sometimes cause unsafe situations. We move faster traffic, such as mopeds and speed pedelecs, from the bicycle path to the car lane.
- The Beatrixlaan takes up a lot of space. Space that could be used for housing, business premises or a better connection between Voorhof and Buitenhof. STIP wants to investigate the redesign of this road.

Sharing together

- Sharing a car, bike or scooter is sustainable and saves space! That is why we are committed to shared transport. In doing so, we pay attention to the quality of the public space. The municipality helps by setting up transport hubs throughout the city.
- Shared bicycles, scooters or steps are perfect before or after a journey in public transport. That is why we invest in sufficient parking spaces at train and bus stations and the integration of shared transport into travel apps.
- The campus is the place to experiment. Together with TU Delft and companies in the area, we are realising a pilot with shared scooters. These are ideal means of transport between the campus and the new Delft Campus train station.

Train, tram and bus

- Public transport must be affordable for everyone. STIP wants public transport to compete with cars in terms of price and quality. Otherwise it will never be a good alternative!
- Good public transport connections between the train stations and the campus are of great importance. The Sebastiaansbrug is finished, so the tram connection between the station and the TU campus can finally be built. We also work on new public transport from Delft Campus station to the campus and the surrounding area.
- The region must be easily accessible from Delft by public transport. STIP wants to improve bus and tram connections to Naaldwijk/Hoek van Holland and Pijnacker/Zoetermeer.



Parking

- In 2040 the city centre will be completely free of cars! We will make room for greenery, a bench and bicycles! We will transform the Gasthuisplaats into a city park. We will park the cars in car garages on the edge of the inner city.
- We switch to sustainable transport that takes up less space. As a result, we will not have to use the limited space for cars. Parking standards can be lowered in the long term thanks to this transition.
- It is better to pay a little parking fee than to have no parking at all. In order to keep car parking on the right track, we continue to proactively regulate it.
- More tracks and fewer lanes! STIP opposes the widening of the A4 motorway between Delft and Schiedam. Instead, we are committed to four train tracks from The Hague, past Delft to Schiedam.

Clean and smart delivery

- Delivery with the cargo bike! Sounds good, right? From distribution centres close to the motorway, we are committed to smart, clean and quiet goods transport through Delft for both companies and residents.
- To reduce pollution and nuisance from heavy transport, we are committed to a zero-emission inner city by 2025 for goods transport. We also tighten up environmental zones in the rest of the city.



Outdoor space

Delft is growing! As a result, the city is becoming increasingly crowded. This brings challenges with it. We need the space to move around, to meet each other and to prepare the city for the future. By cleverly combining these different objectives everywhere in Delft, we can make the city even more beautiful!

Space for water, greenery and insects

- A future-proof city is a green city. That is why we ensure better maintenance of the current parks, make greenery standard in the design of public spaces and challenge people in the city to make their surroundings greener.
- To make good use of the space, we also make use of roofs. For example for water collection, energy generation, greenery or something fun like a café or restaurant.
- We love insects! The ecosystems that we depend on collapse without them. By mowing the public green spaces smartly there is always food for insects.
- To cool down in an increasingly hot city, we make space for water. That means more fountains, new canals and a place for outdoor swimming!



Inspiring space

- We proudly exhibit Delft innovations at busy locations around the city. In this way, we continue to build on Delft's image as a city of technology and innovation.
- We use the design of public spaces to encourage good behaviour. STIP therefore wants a place to spray graffiti legally. This would brighten up the area and combat illegal graffiti.
- We stimulate innovation and creativity. After the success of the 'Green Village' regulation-free zone, we are also creating regulation-free zones in other places. No expensive permits need to be issued and you can get straight down to work with your innovative ideas.
- We speed up innovation in new area developments by tightening up the requirements. We build new districts that are better insulated, greener and more economical.

Smart space

- Citizens of Delft must be able to walk through Delft unhindered. That is why we create a testing framework, register and reporting obligation for sensors in public space. This ensures transparency about which data is collected by whom.
- On your bike in the rain... you want to get home quickly. With smart traffic lights that turn green faster when it rains, we will help you.
- We make work with work! That is why we immediately adapt the layout of the street to major interventions, such as replacing the sewers. Of course in consultation with the people living in that street. Then, the ground only has to be opened once. Saves time and money!

Equal opportunities


In the Netherlands, too, the place where you are born determines your health, your career and even your life expectancy. As a municipality, we must look at how we can use our policies to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to progress. We do this, for example, by working on mixed neighbourhoods, but also by taking steps in education.

City for everyone

Delft is an enormously diverse city with people of a colourful rainbow of backgrounds, sexual orientations and identities. Every person in Delft deserves to feel safe and be able to grow. This is not always the case. That is why it is important that we, as a municipality, commit to an inclusive city. STIP wants this to be anchored in policy and proudly display this to the entire city.

Inclusieve stad

- STIP wants Delft to radiate inclusiveness. We do this by showing inclusive art and information in public space. Think for example of the rainbow bridge in front of the station.
- Meeting and connecting are essential for mutual understanding, respect and friendship between different groups. This is why STIP wants the municipality to actively seek out these connections and to support initiatives that make this possible.
- Everyone is allowed to be themselves. That is why Delft continues to support the LGBTQIA+ community through policy, education and the facilitation of safe spaces.
- Discrimination is not tolerated. Therefore, the municipality provides information at schools and sports clubs among other things.



Delft recognizes its colonial past and carries this out by, for example, celebrating Keti Koti and permanently displaying the downside of the colonial past in the city.

Delft welcomes

- The municipality will soon have more tasks in civic integration. We make the courses tailor-made. Becoming Dutch should be effective and fun for every newcomer!
- We give people with residence permits a warm welcome. By spreading the intake throughout the city, it is easier to mix with other residents. They make Delft their new home.
- Newcomers must also be able to get along in Delft. Therefore, STIP wants good quality civic integration, including language lessons.

Inclusive organisation

- The municipal organisation must be a mirror of Delft society. We are working on this by recruiting young talent with diverse backgrounds.
- We want all policies in Delft to be inclusive. With diversity tests we check whether policy has unintended consequences for certain groups.
- The municipality is an inclusive organisation and proudly shows this. With gender-neutral toilets in municipal buildings and on the street we set a good example.
- The municipality does not work with organisations that discriminate, for example on the housing market or in their personnel policy.

Good education

We are fortunate in the Netherlands that everyone can attend school up to a certain age. Unfortunately, a person's origin, health or family has a big influence on how well every student does in school. By investing in good education, we give everyone the chance of a great career!

Ready for take-off

- Preventing a mistake saves a lot of hassle and money. By teaching young people about topics such as debts, internet safety and discrimination, we prepare them for the world.
- The municipality stimulates cooperation between schools and companies. In this way we ensure that schooling matches work.
- Does someone skip school? There's often more to it than that. We need to get to work on that quickly. That way we keep everyone on track for a flying start of their careers.



Opportunities for every student

- For young people with a disability, it is more difficult to work alongside their studies. By bringing the study grant for students with a disability up to the required level, we prevent them from not studying because they have to borrow more money.
- Early language instruction is offered to children with language deficits to help them keep up with the rest.
- You can make it in Delft! Delft has technological companies, schools and a university. STIP wants to continue with initiatives such as Smart Makers Delft. Here, doers are trained to work with technology. Together with businesses, we respond to the economy of tomorrow.



Work pays off

Corona has left more people in debt. Family, friends and the municipality often know nothing about it. Debts are taboo. The problems then quickly get worse: debts make you stressed, which in turn makes it harder for you to earn money and so on. STIP wants to prevent this. We help people with finding work and if things do go wrong we help them as quickly as possible.

At work

- Every citizen of Delft deserves a job. After all, work is the best medicine against poverty, debts and other problems. We help people find work with appropriate support and by getting more Delft businesses to work together with Werkse!
- Work must pay off! That is why we make it possible for people on welfare to earn an extra income. We will also ensure that working more does not lead to less money. This is what happens now if you earn just above the social security level.
- An internship is the first step towards a job. The municipality is committed to providing sufficient internships in its own organisation and at institutions in the city. It also cooperates with partners such as JINC and projects like Stage Nieuwe Stijl.
- Towards a society without jobless people! By offering retraining in growth sectors such as healthcare and technology, we are bringing that goal closer.

A human touch

- Many debts are invisible and people don't raise the alarm in time. That is why the municipality focuses on early, accessible and personal contact. A generous policy provides peace of mind and structure.
- We break the taboo of debt by talking about it. We focus on providing information to vulnerable groups such as young people, status holders, people with a mental disability and people on benefits.

Giving support

- Young people in debt start their adult lives at a disadvantage. The 'Jeugd Perspectief Fonds' frees them from debt and removes their worries. Therefore, STIP wants to increase the fund and meet demand.
- People in financial need deserve help as soon as possible. The 'Eerder Melden Minder Achterstanden' approach identifies debts at an early stage and prevents larger problems from arising. This approach has proven to be successful and should therefore be expanded.
- We strive for a system of benefits that is as simple as possible, such as sanitation, which puts people first. We also participate in national experiments with, for example, the basic income or the negative income tax.
- Homeless young people are a very vulnerable group. By paying more attention to them in our policy and by applying tailor-made solutions, we reduce the number of homeless young people.
- Students should also be entitled to a waiver or reduction in waste collection levies. At the moment, they often do not have this right. Not even when they have hardly any income and are deeply in



Healthy and safe living


Care in Delft is under pressure. Because of budget cuts from the State and rising costs, we are faced with difficult choices. STIP gives priority to people who need care the most. In addition, we want a transition from heavy care to prevention of care. We will invest in sport, innovation and awareness. This is how we make Delft healthy and safe.

Sport connects and makes you healthy

Sport is an indispensable part of a healthy life. Sport does not only keep us healthy but it also connects people in Delft. By removing barriers to exercise, we pave the way for a healthier and happier life in Delft. We bring residents back into exercising!

Easy sports

- Every child should be able to play sports. If parents are unable to pay the contribution, the municipality will help out.
- Outdoors fitness equipment, street dancing and parkour are popular. That is why we place more of the equipment in more locations.
- Exercise should be easy. With great running, walking and cycling routes, nobody can sit still anymore.



Enjoyable sports

- The people of Delft deserve clean and safe swimming water! The Delftse Hout should soon be free of algae. Then we all have a place to cool off in the summer.
- The skate park is a place for young people in Delft. Placing new, challenging objects for and with the Delft skaters makes it even more fun.
- Delft is a city of Olympic rowing champions! LAGA, Proteus-Eretes and De Delftsche Sport are given the space they need. The Schie is designed in such a way that sports can be played safely.

Sporting togehter

- Neighbourhood sports coaches almost literally get people out of their chairs to exercise. We will continue to support them. They are also an important link between care, school and the neighbourhood.
- Many people play sports with an association. That is why the municipality supports these associations. They are an indispensable part of Delft's sports policy.
- We can make wider use of sports canteens and gymnasiums. By teaching, vaccinating or organising events, we can make the most of the space!

Healthy citizens of Delft

Everyone needs help sometimes. Unfortunately, this help is not always available to everyone. STIP believes that our healthcare system should be aimed at supporting independence and customisation to make people self-reliant. This means that we use budgets widely and that care providers work together with the city. In order to provide the best quality healthcare, we make use of the knowledge available at universities and colleges. By using smart healthcare policies, we give the people of Delft a bright future.

Prevention is better than cure

- Culture and sport can prevent health problems, improve lifestyle and have a positive effect on the treatment of illness. That is why we want to build a bridge between healthcare and culture and sport.
- We stimulate innovation to make healthcare even better. By also purchasing care from new, small companies we give new healthcare a chance. This offers more freedom of choice and quality of healthcare.
- We don't fight the symptoms. For example, if someone has no home, it is almost impossible to solve other problems. That is why we pull out all the stops to provide vulnerable young people with a suitable home.
- The right solution for the right problem. With support for general practitioners and a "social map" for social workers, parents and young people, you will always find the right person for help.

Healthy young people

- Help in the neighbourhood, school or library. Sometimes young people do not want, do not dare or cannot ask for help. As a result, small problems can become large. By making help accessible, we can offer help faster and prevent more severe healthcare.
- You get healthcare until you're better. So we don't interrupt care just like that. STIP will therefore remain alert to, for example, a smooth transition from youth care to regular care if you are over 18.
- Many students live in Delft. Therefore, STIP believes that not only educational institutions but also the municipality are responsible for their health. By working together better, we can help young people more quickly with the right expertise.

Good sex

- Everyone wants nice, desirable, safe and equal sex. But how? Many young people do not know. That is why more attention should be paid to sexual diversity, sexual pleasure and respect for desires and boundaries in sexual education.
- Sex is an important part of life. That is why sexual education and health should be given attention in different places. Think about youth care, sports or youth work.
- In Delft, there should be a free pregnancy and STD testing facility for young people. You should also be able to come here anonymously for advice on sexual abuse or anything else you are worried about. That is why we continue to support the STD consultation hour at the JIP.
- Sex workers need to be able to go to the municipality with care questions, just like other professionals. Supporting organisations like SHOP can help with this. Unfortunately, sex workers do not know these organisations well, which leaves them with questions. The municipality helps to increase the visibility of these organisations.

Mental health

- Waiting times for the GGZ are too long. This makes psychological problems worse. By freeing up more money for this at a regional level, we can reduce the waiting times.
- We want to combat drug, alcohol and gambling addictions by launching campaigns that make the subject open for discussion.
- Loneliness must be tackled, for young and old. Physical encounters are central here, for example in the theatre or on the sports field!

Social support

- Informal care can sometimes last for years and can be hard on informal caregivers. Therefore, it should be possible to get a break through temporary substitute care.
- We do not want the deficits to increase further as a result of the WMO being transferred to the municipality's responsibilities and budget. That is why we focus on a good basis.



Safe city

Delft can be even safer. We do not pay enough attention to the prevention of unsafe situations. That is why STIP wants to invest in prevention. With a targeted approach to preventing problems, we can make Delft a physically and digitally safe city! Below you can read how STIP will achieve this.

Safe from the start

- By investing in liveable neighbourhoods where there is something to do and a public space designed as an open place to stay, we can avoid unsafe situations. The community centre is the place in the neighbourhood where the people of Delft can meet each other!
- Wey figures are the central contact in your neighbourhood! The municipality supports and gives key figures an important role in Delft.
- Direct and accessible contact between inhabitants of Delft prevents problems. Set up a neighbourhood chat with all houses in the neighbourhood. This makes Delft safer.



Safe on the streets and online

- People should feel safe when walking down the street. A clean, lively and well-lit street is a street with less crime.
- Camera surveillance only shifts the problem and creates the risk of violating the privacy of bystanders. There is no place for police drones with cameras in our city. Locations of cameras should be 100% public.
- We are working hard to create a safe digital world! Delft sets a good example by not using third-party trackers on municipal websites.

Safe drug use

- By legalising both the sale and the regulated cultivation of weed, we reduce illegal situations. This actively works against crime. That is why Delft wants to participate in national experiments and actively declares itself in favor of a regulated drugs policy.
- We do not stimulate drug use. However, when people in Delft want to use XTC, for example, they should be able to do so safely. Therefore, STIP wants a place in Delft where you can get free drug testing.
- We meet our residents and entrepreneurs from Delft by making a fifth and sixth license for a coffeeshop possible. It is important that the people of Delft can buy soft drugs in a legal and safe place!

Money and a strong democracy

A municipality must be there for its residents. Even with the limited financial resources, services must be up to standard and the people of Delft must be able to have a proper say in the city council's plans.

Easily accessible

The municipality is the contact point for its residents in many matters. It is important that the municipality wants to help its residents well, is accessible and provides tailor-made solutions. STIP wants to achieve this.

- Municipal services must be accessible to everyone. Whether this means communicating in clear language, continuing to use cash money or making websites accessible to the visually impaired.
- STIP wants the municipality to be available when residents need it. For example by fast online communication or by opening the town hall in the evening one day a week.
- The municipality ensures that residents do not have to rely on social media to stay informed. Therefore, the municipality posts all information and current affairs on its own website, and only refers to social media channels.
- There are more than 6,000 international people in Delft, who must also be able to find their way around the municipality. Therefore, important documents are available in English and you can visit the city office in English.

- Delft should not depend on privacy unfriendly platforms such as WhatsApp to be easily accessible online, for example by providing alternatives via Signal and a chat function on the website.
- The municipality looks actively at new applications to improve its services, such as sending documents to people at home or a chatbot that can link residents directly to the right civil servant.

Delft thinks along

The municipality of Delft is constantly making numerous plans for the future. With Delfts Doen, we involve people in Delft in the drafting of these plans, and the various interests can be properly weighed. Ultimately, of course, the plans are made for the city. STIP has the following points for attention:

- Aldermen are committed to be approachable and stay in contact with the people of Delft, for example with a weekly online consultation hour.
- STIP wants the municipality of Delft to give young people a voice in important issues for the future, such as energy transition. After all, they will have to live with the consequences of the policy for the longest time. By organizing targeted participation for youth, we collect their ideas.
- STIP is a fan of a periodic neighbourhood watch, in which the city council goes into a neighbourhood together once in a while. This way the entire city council regularly meets with the inhabitants of Delft to pick up problems from the neighbourhoods.
- STIP is not afraid of new forms of participation, such as Right to Challenge, and encourages the municipality to experiment with them. STIP also wants to inform inhabitants proactively about developments around them.

Independent journalism is important for the city, which is why STIP wants to support local journalists, for example by means of a media fund.

Financial stability

Delft has limited financial scope, but faces many challenges. STIP chooses to continue to invest in the city wherever possible, so that it will be a nice place to live in the long term. The city's debt is manageable, also in the coming years. Read below how we make these financial decisions.

- The national government will have to come up with structurally more money so that municipalities can carry out their tasks properly without having to cut into other parts of the budget.
- Politicians often focus on short-term plans, but pay less attention to the long term. To ensure that Delft invests in the long term, STIP wants to continue using Fonds 2040. From this fund, independently positively assessed projects can be financed.
- We invest as much as possible together with partners. This way the municipality does not invest on its own in projects that are good for the entire region.
- STIP appreciates the efforts of the employees of the municipality, who work every day to make the city better. Therefore, we want to ensure a high job satisfaction of civil servants.
- We will continue to provide targeted, multi-year subsidies to give applicants more certainty. We make agreements on these subsidies to be able to check whether the objectives are being achieved.
