Lawyers are analytical problem-solvers who are experts at writing and research, can foresee consequences of actions and language choices, and advocate strongly for their clients, whether in the public or private sector. Lawyers both protect the U.S. by ensuring the rule of law, and they argue to change existing rules.

A law degree is a general degree. You learn to "think like a lawyer" in law school, but do not major in a certain type of law. When you graduate, you can apply your analytical skills to many different practice areas.

CONSULTING, LITIGATION CONSULTANT

Litigation consultants work at firms whose clientele includes law firms and legal professionals. They support the work of lawyers by analyzing data and conducting research. Consultants offer technological expertise, project management support, and strategic direction to enhance lawyers' ability to win cases.

GOVERNMENT LITIGATION, INVESTIGATIVE ANALYST

Investigative Analysts help prosecutors, who represent the government at local, state, and federal levels and prosecute individuals accused of crimes, prepare factual elements of the case. They can also assist public defenders as they litigate on behalf of indigent defendants in criminal cases brought against them by the state. In these roles, they help manage sizeable caseloads and have exposure to hands-on litigation work early in their careers.

CORPORATE LAW, PARALEGAL

Paralegals support corporate attorneys with all aspects of a case, focusing on narrow issues that support larger arguments. They work mostly in large law firms or in-house (inside a corporation) and on a variety of subject matter areas, such as finance, banking, capital markets, private equity, and tax. The work of a corporate attorney can include advising on legal rights and obligations, representing a company in litigation or negotiations, and/or overseeing restructuring, mergers, and acquisitions.

PUBLIC INTEREST LAW, RESEARCH ANALYST

Public interest law can touch any substantive area of law—civil rights, environmental law, child advocacy, urban development, health law—and public interest work includes a wide array of tasks, from courtroom advocacy and litigation to transactions and business law matters. Public interest lawyers represent clients who may otherwise not have access to legal support. Research analysts support cases and advocacy work through meticulous research and understanding of policy.
