Steps for Success in the Recruiting Cycle

Making the transition to a new college while recruiting for key industries is taking place can feel overwhelming at times! We are committed to ensuring your success on campus and post-graduation.

This guide is designed to provide a centralized outline of key resources, tips, and tricks that will help transfer students navigate their transition to life at UChicago and plan for a fulfilling career. Where to Start

Beginning the process of choosing an intended career path can seem like a big challenge to some! It is important to start your career exploration early so that you have enough time and information to make an informed decision, and to provide enough time for technical and experiential training you may need in your chosen career path. Below are some helpful ways you can get started on your journey:

- 1. **Meet with your Career Adviser!** Each student is assigned a primary career adviser. They can provide support in career exploration, brainstorming, strategy planning, resume review, interview practice, and have a wealth of resources to support your career exploration.
- 2. Attend Career Advancement events and workshops! There are numerous workshops throughout the year focused on both career exploration and skill building! Below is a list of some of the many upcoming workshops that will be offered throughout the year:

- 3. **Join an RSO!** An RSO is a "Registered Student Organization" and UChicago is home to many high quality professional RSOs that provide students an opportunity to learn about new industries, build skills and experience, and create a network of older students and alumni. We highly recommend all students to join at least one professional RSO! You can expect to apply to join RSOs at the beginning of the Fall Quarter. Please visit BluePrint for a complete listing and additional information on each RSO.
- 4. Another good way to learn about different career paths is to simply browse and read interesting job descriptions **posted on Handshake**. Reading through job descriptions that you may find interesting yet unfamiliar can help expose you to opportunities you may not have previously considered, and gives you a helpful perspective on the realities and responsibilities of a given career.
- 5. Once you have identified a job or career path that you are interested in, **arranging networking calls** with industry professionals is a great way to learn more. <u>LinkedIn</u> is a great platform to search for and





identify UChicago Alumni who work in a particular field. Alumni are often willing and enthusiastic to help young students learn about their field and how to get there.

6. Apply for a Career Trek! Treks are career exploration experiences that bring groups of 15-25 students to meet with employers throughout the United States and around the world. Participating students have the opportunity to expand their professional network, learn more about potential jobs and internships, and find out whether a particular career field matches their interests, skills, and values. The application for Treks opens at the end of September.

Resources to Get Recruiting-Ready

It provides firms a way to pre-screen candidates, and provides the student with additional educational and networking opportunities. Firms track attendance which can help when applying to other internships in the future.

Industry Guides: What is Investment Banking and What is Consulting guides provide an in-depth overview of the Banking and Consulting industries, the career path, day-to-day work, as well as tips for success. The Corporate Sector Overview gives an overview of roles in business outside of Finance and Consulting.

Our Corporate and Business Roles SharePoint page also gives students opportunities to explore the opportunities, potential career paths, and recruiting timelines for the corporate world, including Leadership Development and Rotational programs, where numerous UChicago alums have started great careers in business.

Resume and Cover Letter Resources

Updating your resume and cover letter is a primary key step in preparing for recruiting! Remember that a strong, stand-out resume will help you make it through the screening process so you can get selected for an interview. So your resume is essentially your calling card to interviews.

Application Timelines

Companies across the board continue to accelerate the recruiting process each year. Below is an overview of recruiting cycles in some key areas:

Investment Banking: The recruitment cycle for investment banking typically is the earliest to kick off. Major banks start with <u>Diversity & Accelerated Recruiting events</u> beginning in the spring of first year, and extending into the summer and fall of second year. Formal recruiting for 3rd year internships kicks off in late December and early January of second year, and typically wraps up by mid-march of second year. That means most major banks are recruiting for 3rd year internships nearly 18 months in advance! This is why it is so critical to make a plan and get started early in your academic career!

Asset Management: Asset Management includes wealth management, private banking, traditional asset managers, hedge funds, and more. The asset management industry is highly fragmented with thousands of firms of varying size across the country. Accordingly, the recruitment process is less uniform than banking but follows a similar trend. Formal 3rd year recruitment typically kicks off in the spring of second year, and new job postings become live continually over the course of the summer and into the fall.

Consulting: Consulting firms begin to open 3rd year internship applications in June following the completion of your second year. Applications will continue to open through early Fall Quarter. Be sure to regularly check Handshake, the weekly Business Bulletin, and company websites for information on specific firm recruiting timelines and application deadlines.

Corporate: Many corporate roles follow more traditional recruiting patterns. For 3rd year internships, be sure to watchout for job postings on Handshake, LinkedIn, Glassdoor, and their own "Careers Page" on their websites as some firms may not post their roles on Handshake. Corporate internship applications typically open at the end of the summer following your second year, and into the fall quarter of 3rd year.

Healthcare: The path to medical school and other health professions starts early! Please check out our <u>Careers in Healthcare</u> website for a detailed look at course requirements, application process, internship and research opportunities, and more!

Policy and Social Impact: There is a wide variety of roles throughout the public policy and non-profit spaces that our students pursue each year! Our Policy and Social Impact team supports students pursuing careers in a broad range of fields including think tanks, local and federal government, global health, human rights as well as with the quickly evolving sectors in sustainability, corporate social responsibility, impact and non-profit consulting, and economic development. STEM: Visit the UChicago Career Advancement sites for more details about careers in <u>biological sciences</u>, <u>physical sciences</u>, <u>engineering</u>, and <u>computer science</u>. There is a wide variety of careers in the STEM field from business & operations to practitioners, and application timelines vary. The best way to get started is to meet with an adviser with expertise in your discipline.

Law: Once you decide to attend law school, <u>Careers in Law</u> offers each student the opportunity to meet with an adviser, either in person or virtually, to strategize about target schools and to review law school application materials. To set yourself up for success, the law school application process preparation starts about one year before the application is due.



Networking Resources

Begin networking now! Reach out to alumni and employees of the firms you are interested in for informational interviews. Use this opportunity to gather information on the different firms, get valuable insights about the industry, and stay on the radar of employers. Interview Preparation

Be prepared to interview when you apply. Interviews can take place as soon as a couple of weeks after applications close or when you apply. Some firms also review applications on a rolling basis, so applying as soon as soon as you are ready and feel prepared for an interview is a good strategy.

Practice Interview Program: Students can practice case interviews and get expert feedback on their skills and techniques through the Practice Interview Program. <u>Appointments are open all year round!</u>

1. Technical & Case Interviews

Many finance roles may include a technical interview component, and many consulting applications feature a case interview. Technical interviewing can be intimidating, but we have lots of resources to help! Please see below for some key resources for investment banking and consulting technical practice.

Regardless of industry focus, we highly recommend **taking classes at Booth** as early in your academic career as possible! 2. Behavioral Interviews

Behavioral interviews are equally important when it comes to securing an offer for an internship or full-time job. It is a great opportunity to sell yourself and make the case for why they should hire you given your unique capabilities.

Company and Industry Research

Do you know which companies you want to recruit for? it's important to do your research and develop a list of target companies to explore in your areas of interest. Your criteria may include industry and job function, geographic location, size of organization, and culture. Visit the company website to learn more about the work they do, clients they serve, their mission and values.

In preparation for your interviews, cultivate the habit of reading company and industry business news daily to stay on top of trends and ideas, and follow news on target companies so you are well prepared to engage in memorable conversations during the interview.
