Accessibility



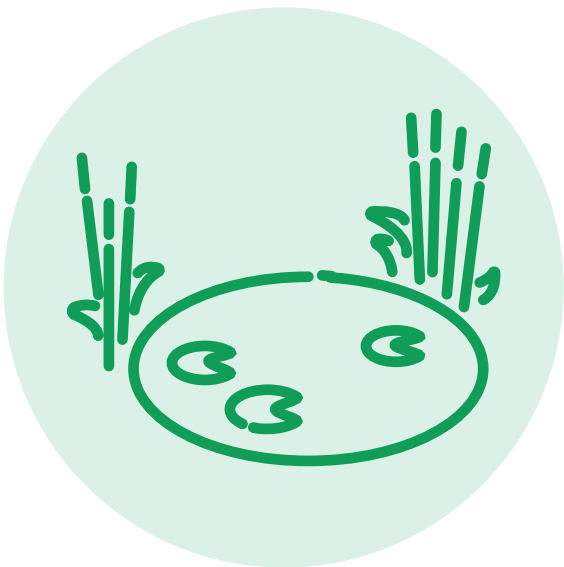
All areas are accessible for wheelchair users. We have disabled toilets on-site.

Dogs



Dogs are welcome on leads in the Farm Shop, Da Costa, Roth Bar, Book Shop, Cloister Courtyard and Farmyard.

They are not permitted in the gallery or garden, unless they are assistance dogs.

We have an outdoor kennel area with water bowls next to the car park where dogs can be left. Please note these are unsupervised.

Food and Drink



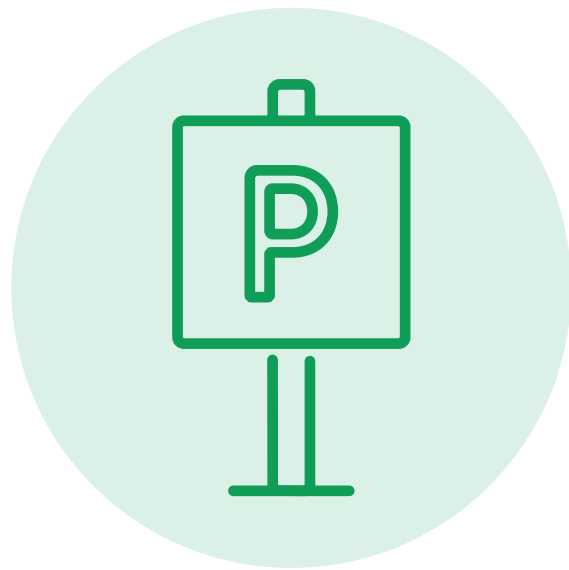
Farm Shop is open 7 days a week from 9 am. Takeaway food and drink from the deli counter can be enjoyed in the Farm Shop indoor seating area and outdoor courtyard, or the Farmyard and Cloister Courtyard.

Da Costa, our on-site Italian restaurant, is open Wednesday – Sunday from 12 pm. Lunch and dinner reservations are available indoors or in the courtyard garden.

Food and drink, including picnics, are not permitted in the gallery and garden.

Please use the recycling bins provided, which are located in the courtyard outside Farm Shop.

Car Parking



There is a car park on-site, with space for coaches and wheelchair parking.

We have several electric vehicle charging points in our car park. Please note that the EV chargers require visitors to use their own charging cable.

Sustainability



In line with the Paris Climate Agreement of the United Nations, we are committed to reducing our carbon emissions by at least 50% by 2030.

We have already implemented several sustainability initiatives on site, which include:

- Using 100% renewable energy
- Recycling 70% of our waste. Anything that cannot be recycled is diverted from landfill and turned into energy
- Reusing our exhibition display materials
- Using low energy LED lights in our galleries and offices.

Angel Otero
Agua Salada

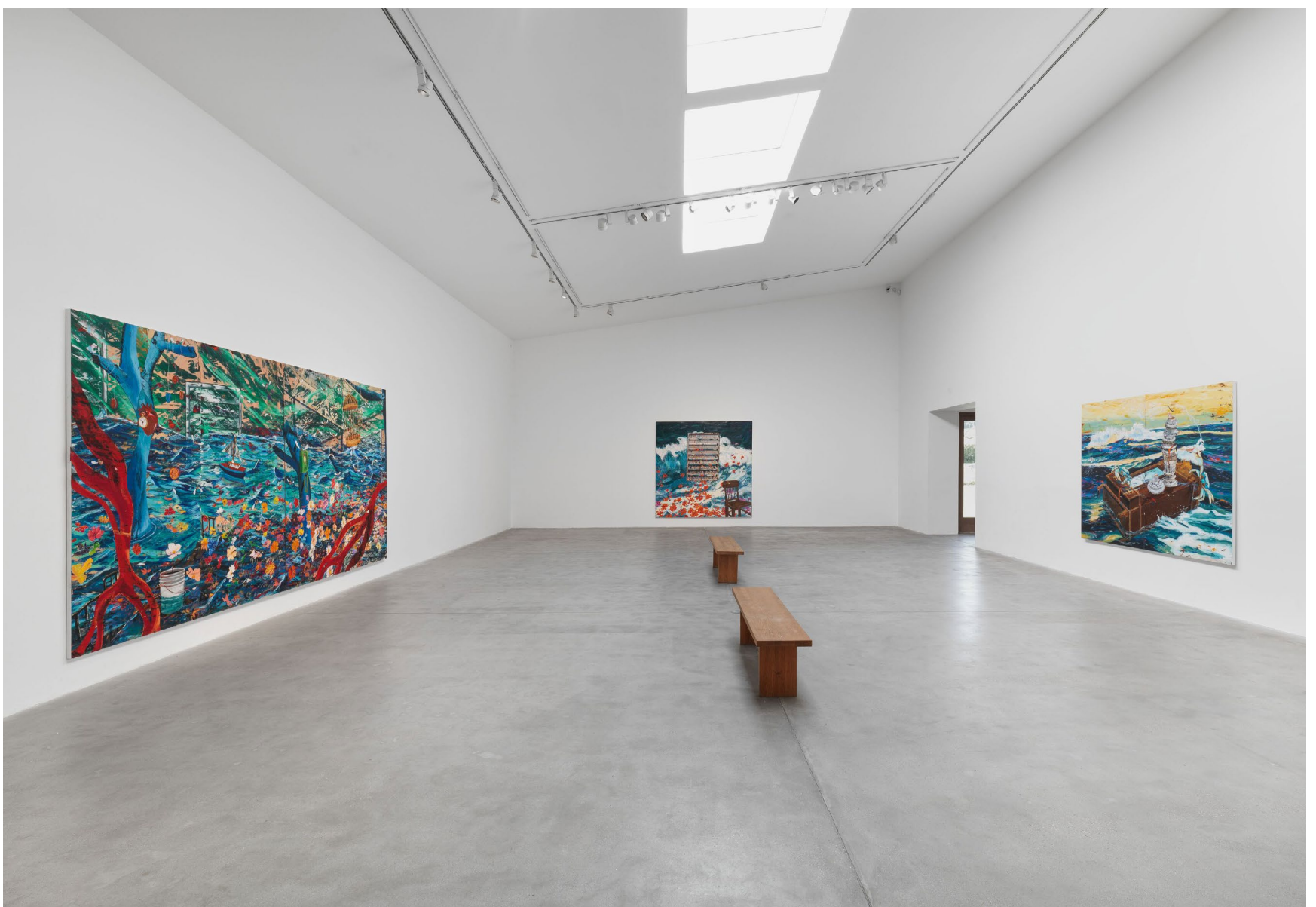

Wednesday – Sunday, 12 – 5 pm

Angel Otero makes his UK debut this spring, featuring a deeply personal body of work completed during an artist residency in Somerset.

Known for his physically immersive approach to paint as material, Otero transforms the medium itself—scraping, layering and peeling dried oil paint to create richly textured compositions that hover between abstraction and figuration.

Moving his studio practice from New York and Puerto Rico temporarily to Somerset, the residency provided Otero with the opportunity to continue his exploration of memory, place and meaning in the context of a new environment.

Education Lab Echoes

2 May – 18 October

Wednesday – Sunday, 10 am – 5 pm

The ‘Education Lab: Echoes’ accompanies the exhibition ‘Angel Otero. Agua Salada,’ and explores how memory shapes who we are.

Developed in collaboration with Museum To You, a Somerset-based charity supporting older adults in care settings and our youth collective, Arthaus, the Education Lab centres on intergenerational exchange and collective creativity.

Community stories, short films and a collaborative memory wall will develop over the course of the exhibition, alongside a soundscape co-produced with local care home residents, inspired by Angel Otero’s reflections on people, place and personal fragments.

Oudolf Field

Wednesday – Sunday, 10 am – 5 pm

Piet Oudolf, the acclaimed Dutch landscape designer, has created the landscaping scheme for the entire site, in collaboration with Urquhart & Hunt. This includes the Oudolf Field—a large perennial meadow situated behind the gallery buildings—and Courtyard Garden in the farmyard.

Carefully shaped and planted, the garden echoes the tradition of classical gardens, but the variety of species and combination of plants creates a looseness, softening the formality of its appearance.

At the top of Oudolf Field sits the Radić Pavilion. Designed by Chilean architect Smiljan Radić, it was installed at Hauser & Wirth Somerset in March 2015, following its unveiling the previous year as the Serpentine Gallery 2014 Pavilion.

Roth Bar

Wednesday – Sunday, 12 – 5 pm

Roth Bar is a site-specific artwork situated within the Threshing Barn at Hauser & Wirth Somerset.

Created by artist Oddur Roth, grandson of the late German-born Swiss artist Dieter Roth, the bar is a dynamic, ever-changing installation composed of salvaged materials and objects from reclamation yards in the surrounding area, inspired by the history of Durslade Farm.

The artwork is available to view during gallery opening hours and is activated as a fully functioning bar for specific events.

Alongside Roth Bar, a wider public program of gallery presentations, talks and community events take place within the Threshing Barn.

Da Costa

Wednesday – Saturday, 12 – 3 pm and 5.30 – 9.30 pm

Sunday, 12 – 4 pm

Da Costa is inspired by Iwan Wirth’s maternal grandfather, who originated from the small mountainous village of Rivamonte Agordino in the Veneto region of Northern Italy. He emigrated to Switzerland in the early 20th Century, where he opened a small restaurant, much loved for its simple, honest fare.

A century later, and some 800 miles from that first restaurant, Da Costa continues this culinary adventure, using freshly grown, seasonal ingredients from Durslade Farm and the surrounding area to create dishes blending the best of both worlds: quintessential Englishness with Italian flair.

Long-time collaborator and architectural practice Laplace helped bring Da Costa to life, through the reimagining of the 74-cover restaurant space built by Bruton-based locals Rob and Sam Moorse.

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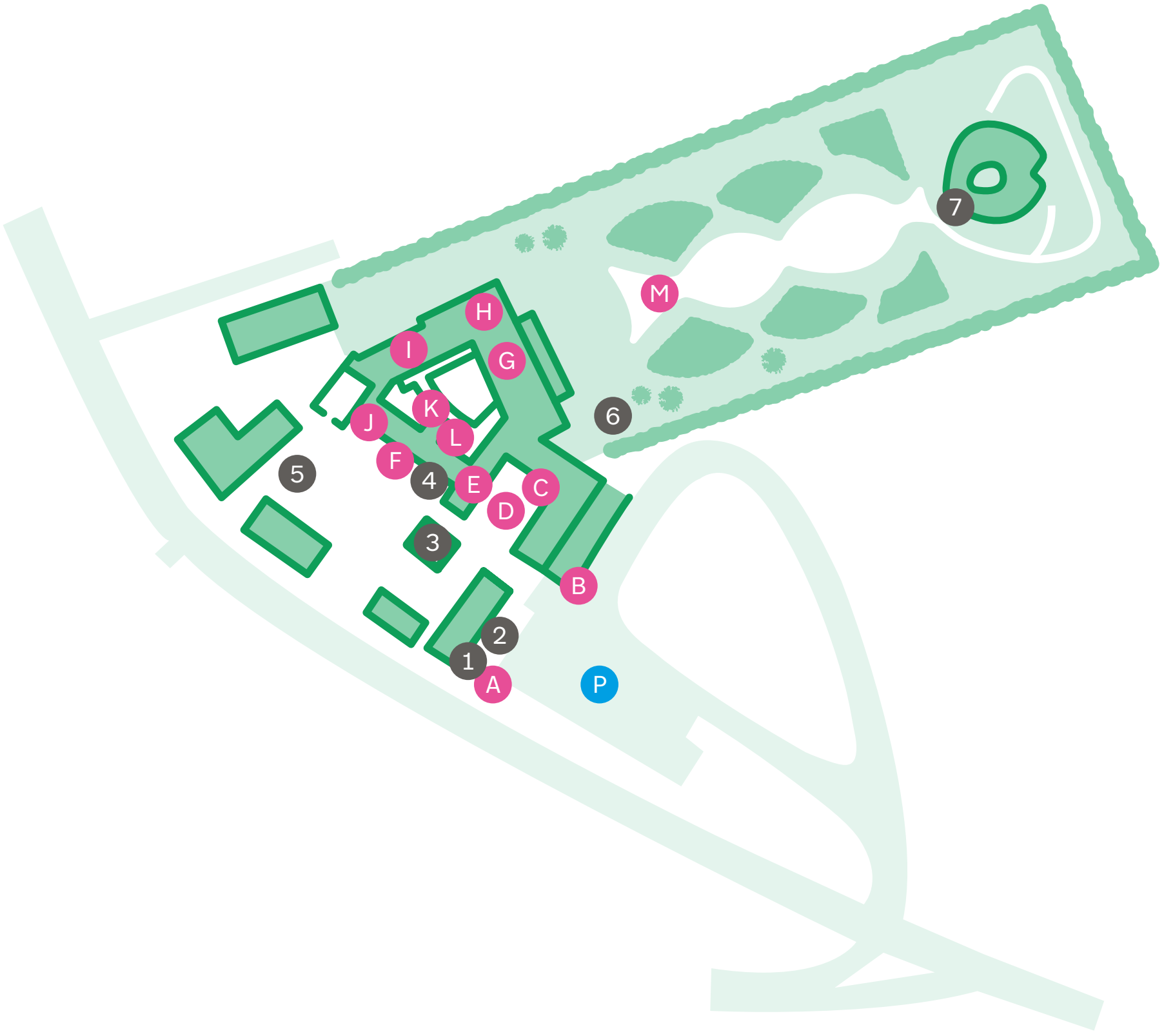

In 2015, inspired by Oudolf Field and the surrounding landscape, Jenny Holzer commissioned local craftsmen to carve boulders from native Somerset Purbeck Thornback stone.

The texts engraved are taken from Anne Carson’s English translation of the ancient Greek poet, Sappho’s incomplete verse, ‘If Not, Winter: Fragments from Sappho.’

It takes approximately 25 minutes to walk the stone trail from start to finish.

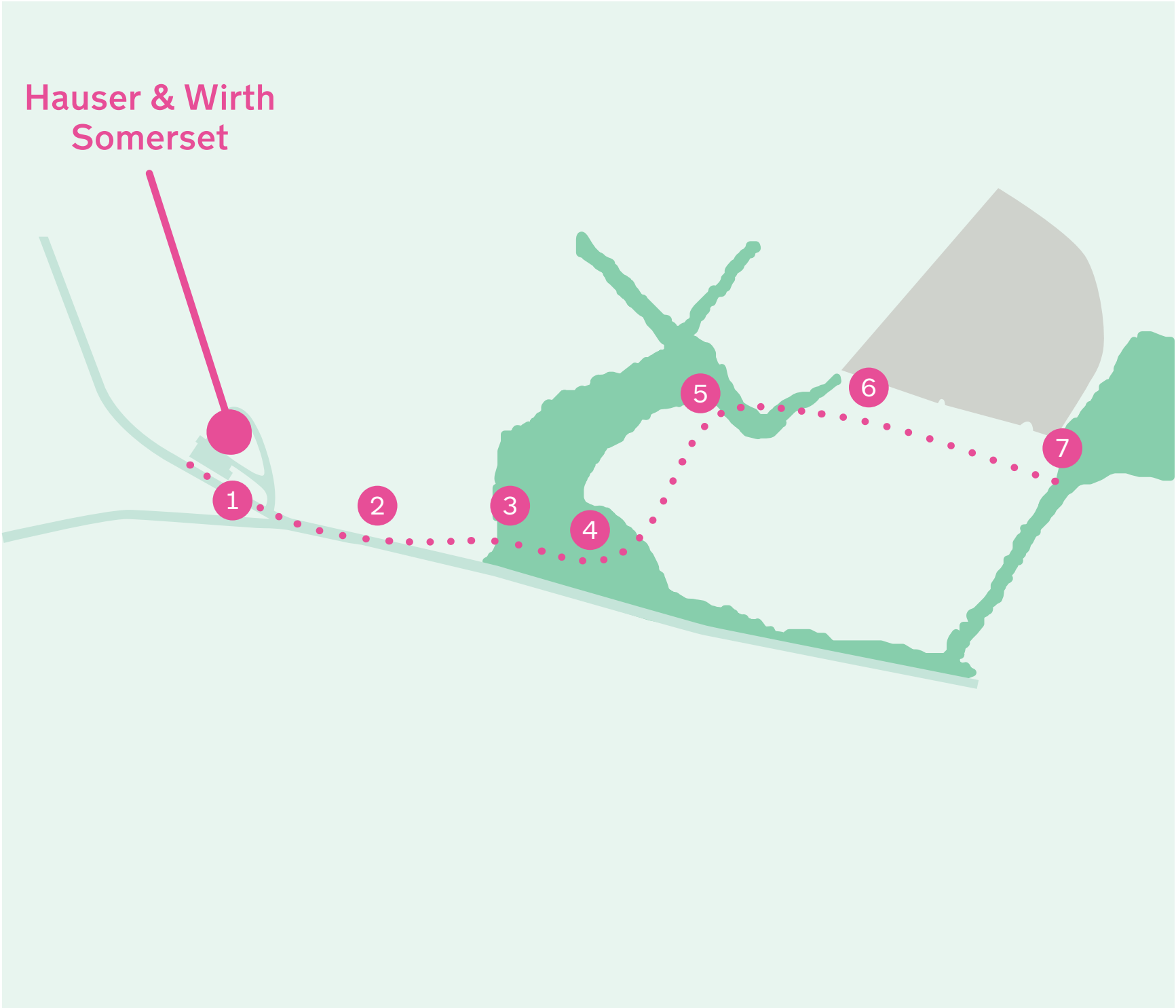

After extensive restorations, Stockwell House, Hauser & Wirth's Grade-II listed building on Bruton High Street, has reopened as a shared space for creative exchange, collaboration and experimentation. The varied programme supports independent projects, research and exhibitions, led by the community.

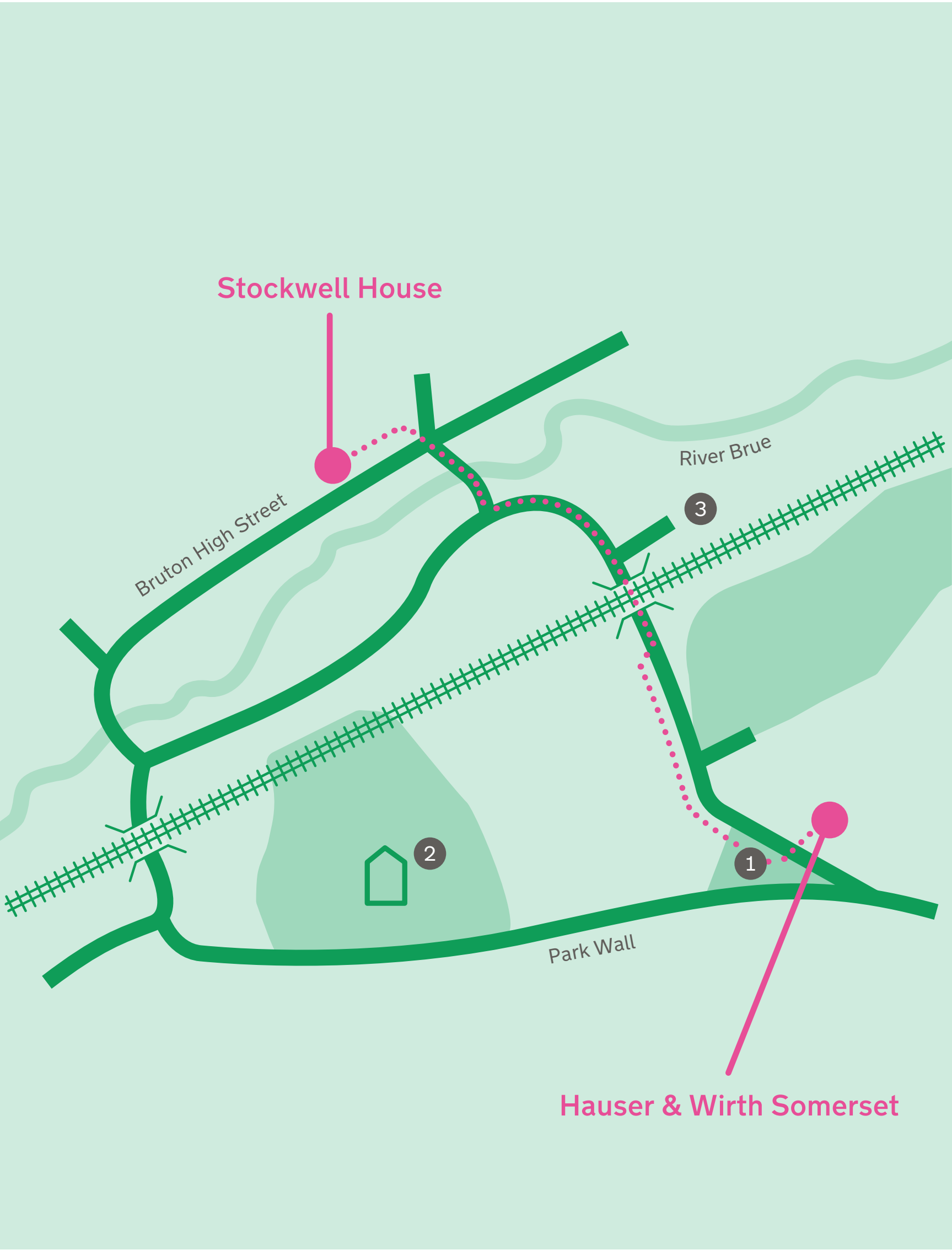
