Accessibility



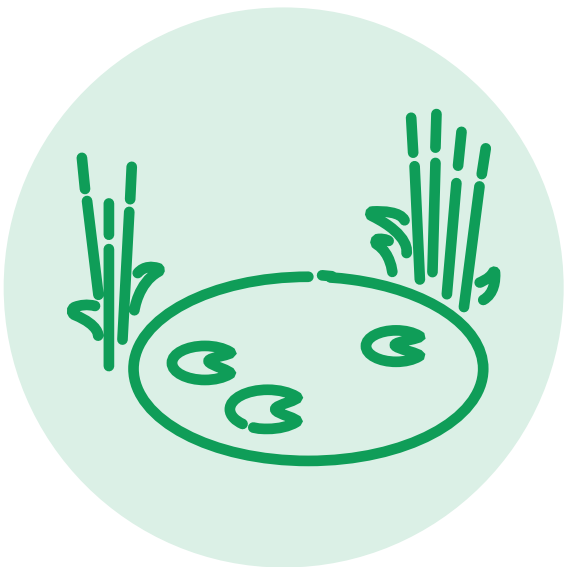
All areas are accessible for wheelchair users. We have disabled toilets on-site.

We have an outdoor kennel area with water bowls next to the car park, where dogs are welcome to wait. Please note these are unsupervised.

Food and Drink

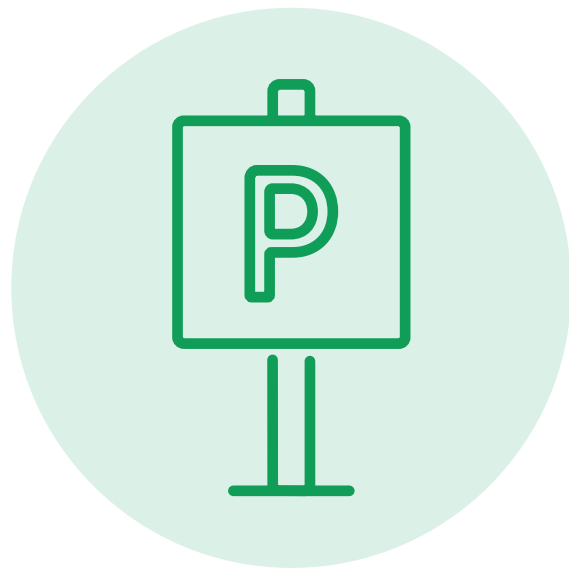


The Farm Shop is open 7 days a week from 9 am.

Roth Bar is open Wednesday – Sunday from 9 am.

Car Parking



There is a car park on-site, with space for coaches and wheelchair parking.

We have several electric vehicle charging points in our car park. Please note that the EV chargers require visitors to use their own charging cable.

Sustainability



In line with the Paris Climate Agreement of the United Nations, we are committed to reducing our carbon emissions by at least 50% by 2030. We have already implemented several sustainability initiatives on site, which include:

- Using 100% renewable energy
- Recycling 70% of our waste. Anything that cannot be recycled is diverted from landfill and turned into energy
- Reusing our exhibition display materials
- Using low energy LED lights in our galleries and offices.

Niki de Saint Phalle & Jean Tinguely
Myths & Machines

Until 1 February 2026

Niki de Saint Phalle (1930 – 2002) and Jean Tinguely (1925 – 1991) are reunited in a major site-wide takeover at Hauser & Wirth Somerset, in collaboration with the Niki Charitable Art Foundation. The first exhibition dedicated to both artists in the UK illustrates Saint Phalle and Tinguely’s visionary artistic output and enduring creative collaboration over three decades.

Two emblematic figures of contemporary art, Saint Phalle and Tinguely defied conventional artmaking and were fuelled with rebellion, in both life and art. The exhibition features unseen works on paper and art decor by Saint Phalle, alongside shooting paintings and monumental open-air sculptures. Iconic kinetic machines by Tinguely range from the 1950s to the final year of his life, in addition to multifaceted collaborative works made by the duo throughout the 1980s.

Oudolf Field

Open Wednesday – Sunday, 10 am – 5 pm

Piet Oudolf, the acclaimed Dutch landscape designer, has created the landscaping scheme for the entire site, in collaboration with Urquhart & Hunt. This includes the Oudolf Field—a large perennial meadow situated behind the gallery buildings—and Courtyard Garden in the farmyard.

Carefully shaped and planted, the garden echoes the tradition of classical gardens, but the variety of species and combination of plants creates a looseness, softening the formality of its appearance.

At the top of Oudolf Field sits the Radić Pavilion. Designed by Chilean architect Smiljan Radić, it was installed at Hauser & Wirth Somerset in March 2015, following its unveiling the previous year as the Serpentine Gallery 2014 Pavilion.

Roth Bar

Björn and Oddur Roth were some of our first artists-in-residence in Somerset back in 2014, when they worked on creating the bar that formed an integral part of Roth Bar & Grill, the gallery's on-site restaurant. 10 years later, Oddur Roth and his team have reimaged Roth Bar as a new site-specific artwork and fully functioning bar inside the Threshing Barn at Hauser & Wirth Somerset.

Created by artist Oddur Roth, grandson of the late German-born Swiss artist Dieter Roth, the bar is a dynamic and changing installation, composed of salvaged materials and objects from reclamation yards in the surrounding area, inspired by the history of Durslade Farm.

Da Costa

Open Wednesday – Saturday, 12 – 3 pm and 5.30 – 9.30 pm
Sunday, 12 – 4 pm

Da Costa is inspired by Iwan Wirth’s maternal grandfather, who originated from the small mountainous village of Rivamonte Agordino in the Veneto region of Northern Italy. He emigrated to Switzerland in the early 20th Century, where he opened a small restaurant, much loved for its simple, honest fare.

A century later, and some 800 miles from that first restaurant, Da Costa continues this culinary adventure, using freshly grown, seasonal ingredients from Durslade Farm and the surrounding area to create dishes blending the best of both worlds: quintessential Englishness with Italian flair.

Long-time collaborator and architectural practice Laplace helped bring Da Costa to life, through the reimagining of the 74-cover restaurant space built by Bruton-based locals Rob

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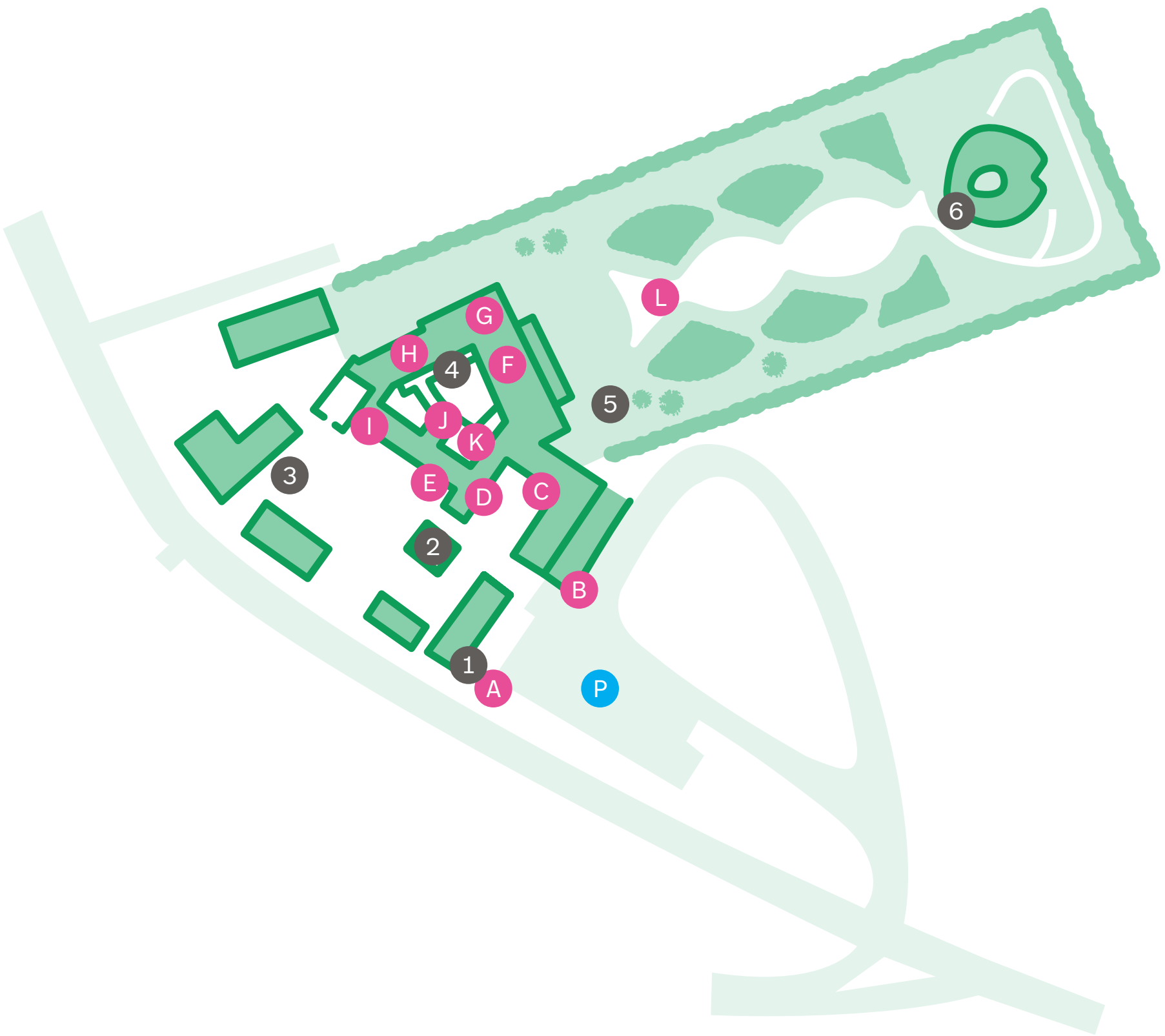

Jenny Holzer Sculpture Trail

In 2015, inspired by Oudolf Field and the surrounding landscape, Jenny Holzer commissioned local craftsmen to carve boulders from native Somerset Purbeck Thornback stone.

The texts engraved are taken from Anne Carson’s English translation of the ancient Greek poet, Sappho’s incomplete verse, ‘If Not, Winter: Fragments from Sappho.’

It takes approximately 25 minutes to walk the sculpture trail from start to finish.

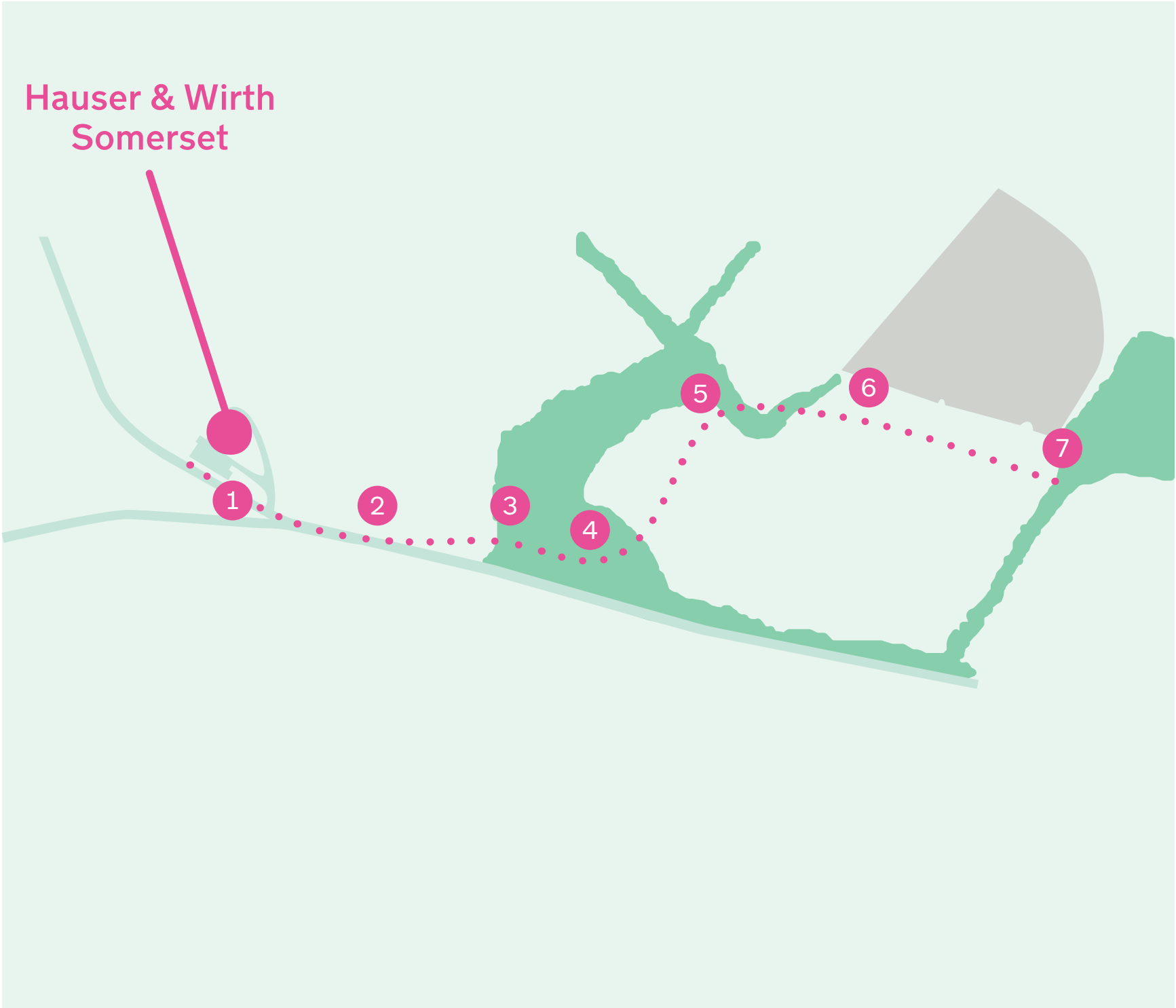

Bruton Walking Map

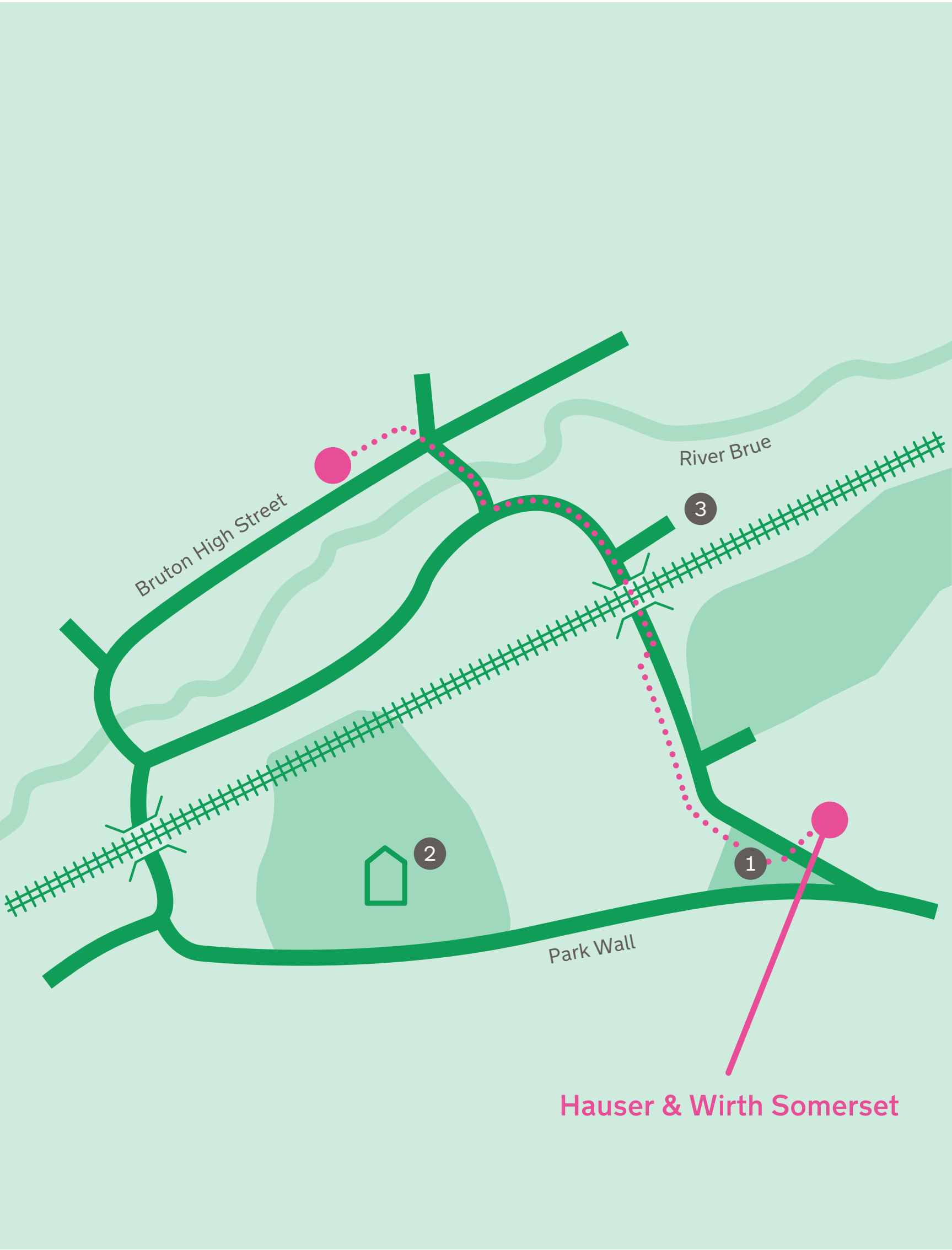

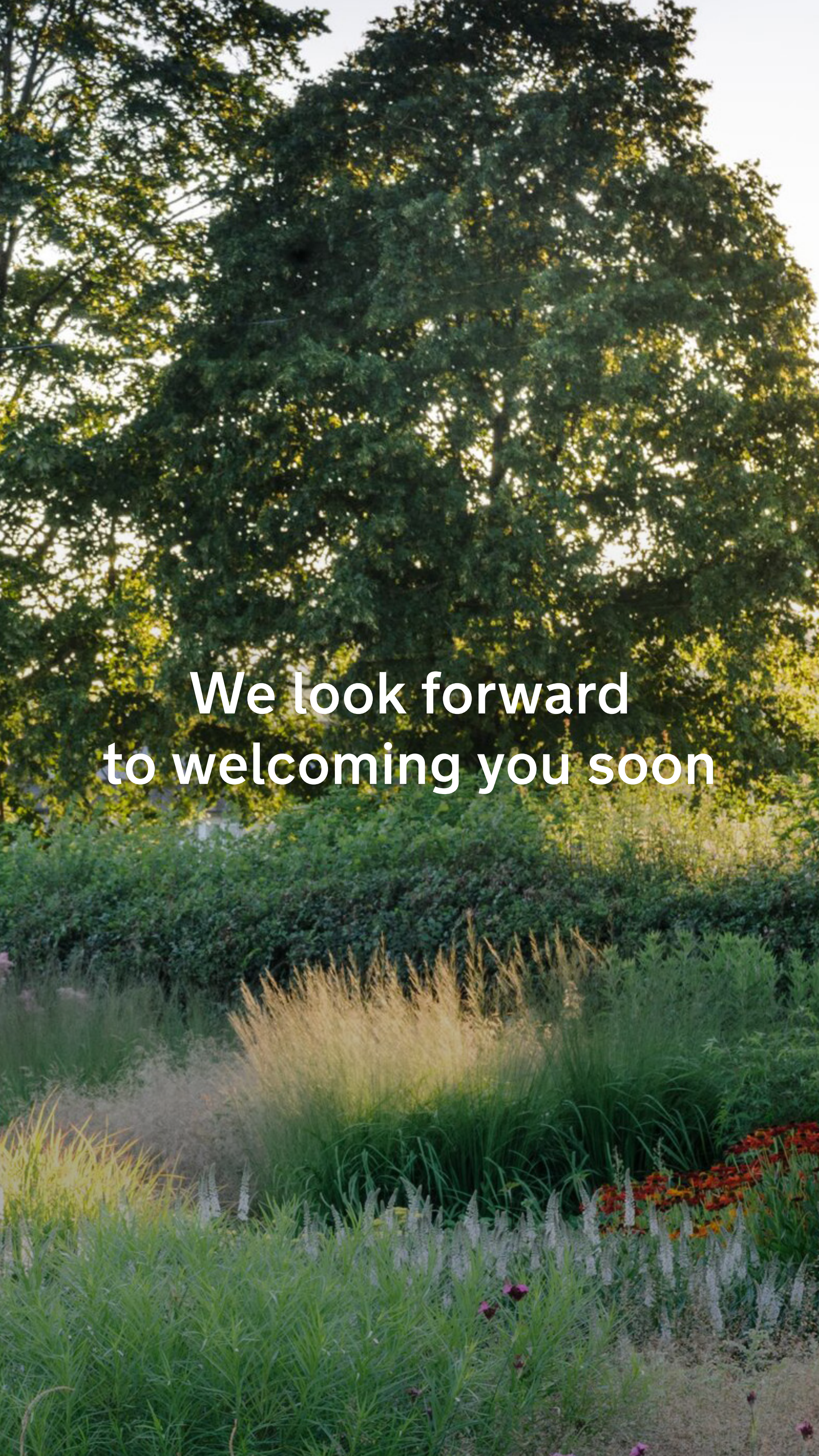
