A Message of Hope



DEAR FRIENDS,

Our hearts are heavier – and yet more hopeful — than ever this year. Destruction in the wake of Typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines is shocking and devastating. We were hurt to our core when seeing families torn apart, homeless children who don't have clean water and infrastructure crumbled to the ground. In the same way we feel that St. Martin de Porres (SMDP) children are our own, our spirits are also connected to children in these ravaged cities.

While we are very fortunate to have missed the storm's path and to have had money to build structures strong enough to withstand winds and floods, we are committed to rebuilding lives of these children. Our mission to provide children with a healthy, supportive environment remains as strong today as over the last eight years. Repairing lives is daunting, but we will focus on helping these desperate children.

After all, the JDVSF was founded on hope. Over the last year, many of our hopes for our children have turned into sustainable solutions. When we looked for a solution to meet the needs of our children, we didn't immediately see the answer. Instead, we found an empty plot of land in Tondo. After

visiting some vocational training centres in Manila, we understood there was an urgent need for accommodating young apprentices. Bringing these two ideas together is how our halfway house, Centro Salvador, began.

We hoped for a solution and we found one. Centro Salvador in Tondo was inaugurated in July, 2013. The dormitory provides support for around 30 teenage boys doing vocational training in Manila. It also feeds malnourished children daily and provides free dental care for impoverished children and adults.

We knew our girls also needed housing and support as they moved on to high school and college. We purchased a 28,000 square meter plot this year and we hope to have a new home next year that will become the centre for vocational training and housing for these young women.

As we built these new homes, we continued supporting improvements to SMDP in 2013. This year solar cells converting sunlight into electricity were installed on all cottage rooftops, reducing an expensive power bill. Children gained further lessons in responsibility as they participated in agriculture chores such as raising cattle and helping create a self-sufficient food supply.

All of this was possible because of our generous supporters and volunteers. Your support for the JDVSF's children has been unwavering and we also appreciate the outpouring of support for children affected by Typhoon Hiayan. We will have information on our website if you'd like to continue supporting children affected by the typhoon.

On behalf of the JDVSF Board of Directors, thank you very much for stepping up to help us turn our biggest hopes for children into realities.

The Strongest People on Earth

We were able to improve our efficiency ratio from 96.04% in 2011-2012 to 97.39% this year. In simple words, 97 cents of every dollar raised directly benefits the children. The construction is planned to take an estimated nine months, and will include building a road to the site among the rice paddies. The Girls' Villages should be completed by next Christmas and will mark another major achievement for the JDVSF.

The Girls' Villages is fully funded thanks to money raised at a London charity event in April, 2013.

Funds were raised for this project in 2009 and 2010, and construction began in December 2010.
