COMFORTING THE ONES LEFT BEHIND

"I Was Lost Without My Best Friend. That Retreat Gave Me Hope."

When Nicole was 22 years old, she married her high school sweetheart, Mike. He had just graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy and together they embarked on a journey our military families know so well.

Hand-in-hand and heart-to-heart, Nicole and Mike held each other up throughout Mike's multiple deployments, always praying for his safe return. So, when Mike finally retired after 23 years of honorable service, the couple was excited for all the years and new adventures they would have together.

But then tragedy struck. In Nicole's own words:

I was widowed in 2022 at the age of 49 when my husband of 27 years died very unexpectedly from what turned out to be toxic burn pit exposure. Mike had been an Air Force Pilot for 23 years and had served in the Middle East. When Mike died, our six children were ages 12 to 22. I was lost without my best friend. Another military widow encouraged me to apply for a grant from the Gary Sinise Foundation to attend a Widows of Heroes retreat. There at the retreat, we were able to begin the process of healing, to find community with women who were successfully walking this journey.

I cannot thank you enough because that retreat gave me hope. Hope that I would survive. Hope that I could still be a really good mom. Hope that we could all find joy again and that we could successfully navigate life even without Mike.

Because of the hope there, and the relationships in the community, I was able to meet a woman who was also widowed who lives just 30 miles from me. This fall, we are launching a locals group in Bozeman, Montana.

But none of that could have been made possible without the grant from Gary Sinise for me to be able to attend. I also have to say, it was really special to be able to tour the Foundation. Mike actually proposed to me the night after we saw Forrest Gump.

So, Gary, thank you very much.



PROVIDING ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENT TO OUR FIRST RESPONDERS Your Support Saved Lives

The alarm sounded at 11:30 PM.

Within moments, firefighters from Nolensville Fire & Rescue were racing to save a home that had been struck by lightning. Each of them wore heavy turnout gear, protective clothing made of many layers of fire resistant material to protect these heroes from the blazing inferno.

That turnout gear was donated thanks to your support.

The family made it out to safety, but four firefighters were injured that night. We are relieved to share that all four are recovering at home.

In the wake of the fire, Captain Sam Killingsworth reached out to share his gratitude with all of you.

I just wanted to reach out and personally thank you and the Gary Sinise Foundation.

Last Tuesday, my guys were burned in the fire caused by lightning in Nolensville. After seeing their injuries and the gear, I am confident in saying that had they not had the new gear provided by the Gary Sinise Foundation they would have been injured much worse. I am so thankful and so relieved that my guys are okay. Your contributions are definitely working to protect our firefighters in the Middle Tennessee Area.



DONOR SPOTLIGHT GSF's Longest Recurring Donor

David Lester has a special distinction at the Gary Sinise Foundation – he's our longest serving monthly donor. Since 2012, David has faithfully supported our mission each month so we can continue our work to restore independence and hope to our nation's heroes.

David has a rich history of service to our country, which started when he was a teenager. In 1957, he joined the Coast Guard Reserve when he was just a junior in high school. He went on active duty the following year in Wilmington, NC. He participated in ocean patrols, law enforcement, and search & rescue operations. Later, he became a firefighter in Maryland, then joined the Maryland State Police. He moved to Arizona and joined the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office where he served for 28 years. He retired in 2006.

When asked why he supports the Gary Sinise Foundation, David says:

I saw what Gary was doing for the military, police and fire disabled personnel and this inspired me to become a donor. The Gary Sinise Foundation builds homes that are customized to the needs of severely disabled veterans, police and fire department members. The Foundation also helps those not so severely injured with medical equipment such as powered wheelchairs.

Today, David enjoys rural living and what he calls the country cowboy way of life. He's RV'd in all 48 of the contiguous states and counts himself as a grateful American.

We enjoy a freedom that no other nation in the world has. Gary is doing a wonderful job and he truly is a great patriotic American. God bless him for all he does.
